Legislation Promised To Ease Impact Of Rates Hike

OTTAWA (CP)—Legislation to ease the impact of the latest freight rate increase on non-central parts of Canada was promised in the speech from the throne read at the opening of Parliament Thursday.

But it gave no clue to the kind of action the government will propose.

It said only that the administration "will recommend action to alleviate the discriminatory effects of the recent horizontal increase in freight rates."

The horizontal percentage boost of 17 per cent went into effect Dec. 1 to cover the \$60,000,000-a-year cost of wage settlements by the railways with employees.

Eight provincial governments—all except Ontario and Quebec—protested to the cabinet that it would discriminate

against them. Their argument was that their areas would have to take on the major part of the burden because competition in the central provinces holds down freight rates there.

It announced recently that a general investigation into Canada's railway problems is in prospect—apart from the short-term move to ease the effects of the latest increase—but there was no mention of this in the throne speech. It has been reported that a royal commission may be set up. However, that would be a matter for the cabinet, rather than Parliament.

Call Avro Plans Blow To Nova Scotia Steel Position

HALIFAX (CP)—The Nova Scotia Labor Federation (CLC) said here Friday that long-range plans for steel production in Montreal by A.V. Roe Canada Limited will place Nova Scotia's basic steel industry in "a poor secondary position" in the company's operations.

The federation said in a statement that Nova Scotia faces "the alarming prospect of being displaced by a fully integrated steel mill in Quebec."

Roe has announced plans to build a \$20,000,000 cold-roll mill at Contrecoeur, near Montreal, and a second stage hot-roll mill

at a cost of about \$55,000,000. The mills will be built by Dominion Steel and Coal Corporation, which now operates a steel mill in Sydney. Dosco is a Roe subsidiary.

Dosco public relations officer C.A. Patterson told the federation in a telegram that the company "has no immediate plans for a fully integrated steel mill at Contrecoeur."

Mr. Patterson said the Sydney plant is considered adequate to meet all Dosco steel requirements "for some years to come."

PM Wants Talks With Smallwood

OTTAWA (CP)—Prime Minister Diefenbaker said Friday he has proposed a meeting Jan. 26 with Premier Smallwood of Newfoundland to discuss the level of federal aid to the province under its terms of Confederation with Canada in 1949.

Replying to the Commons to Chesley W. Carter (L-Burn-Burgeo), he said he proposed the date in a telegram sent at the start of this week in reply to a request by Mr. Smallwood for a meeting.

There has been no indication yet from Mr. Smallwood whether the date was satisfactory.

A royal commission headed by Chief Justice J. B. McNaught of New Brunswick recommended last summer that the federal government pay Newfoundland an additional \$8,000,000 a year. Premier Smallwood's government had asked for \$17,000,000.

Under the 1949 terms of union the commission's job was to recommend what additional financial aid was needed to enable the

province to maintain public services at levels reached subsequent to Confederation without resorting to taxation heavier than taxes in the other Atlantic provinces.

Defence Chiefs Should Remain Silent On Policy

OTTAWA (CP)—Prime Minister Diefenbaker said Friday in the Commons that it is not "fit and proper" for defence chiefs to make public statements on policy.

He was replying to a question by H. W. Herridge (CCF—Kootenai) who said RCAF Air Marshal Roy Slemmon, deputy commander of North American command West) who said RCAF Air Defence Command, challenged government policy when he had stated that manned interceptors are still needed.

Mr. Diefenbaker said he would not deal with the specific question concerning Air Marshal Slemmon but that, as a general principle, it was not fit and proper for defence chiefs to comment publicly on government policy.
