The Home of Intrigues.

DIPLOMACY at Constantinople, during the past months, has presented to the world a strange story. Lord Dufferin, with unrivalled aptitude for diplomatic work, has held endless parleys with the Porte, and has been dexterous enough to cover the hard steel hand of England with the softness of a velvet glove.

Cape Turner, P. E. I.

Extending from Rustico Harbor to Cavendish Sand-hills is a rocky stretch of coast, lashed by the full fury of the Gulf waves. There are fishing stations all along it. But the buildings have to be placed high, on the top of the cliffs; and, every night, with launchway and capstan, the boats have to be hauled up, for safety, too.

The loftiest part of this coast-line, extending farthest into the surges of the Gulf, is Cape Turner, a headland of red sandstone rock, towering a hundred feet above the wave. The strata are of no great hardness of texture, except the bed at the foot of the escarpment, which is a firm calcareous sandstone.

The strata here are horizontal, and the same beds are bound all along the coast from Rustico to New London. They are the uttermost beds on the Island, and belong to the Triassic system.

They are also the newest rock system in the Maritime Provinces. Beginning at the Cobeguid Mountains in Nova Scotia, and travelling northwards towards this point, we successively pass over newer formations, as we leave the mountains and approach the Gulf.

From remote ages, the bed of the Gulf has been a great area of subsidence. Since the beginning of the Carboniferous period, it has gone down twenty thousand feet. If at that time, the highest peak of the rocky mountains had been placed in the Gulf, its top would now be sunk six thousand feet below the level of the sea.

Along the shore about Cape Turner are found some traces of fossil plants. They occur chiefly in a bed of sandstone, stained yellow with carbonate of iron. The fossils themselves are sometimes coated with ferrous oxide.

Canada's Correspondence.

Canadians wrote 72,000,000 letters and post-cards during 1880. This would give an average of 18 letters per head. The average number of letters per capita written in Great Britain during the same year was 37, and the average in the United States was 22.

Fuller Particulars from the Seat of War.

The London News has the following from Suez:—Have just returned from Shalof, when I witnessed a fight in which 250 of our men, including highlanders, blue jackets and marines brilliantly defeated twice their number of the enemy.

General Wolsey is now reconnoitering at Nefiche. The second army division has been ordered to hold itself in readiness for a pursuit of the enemy in the event of their retreat.

The main body of Arabs, 2,500 strong, gone to Geneffe, taking with it a quantity of railway stock. A further report from Admiral Hewitt, dated Suez, 6.15 p. m., yesterday, makes the enemy's loss in fighting at Shalof, 168 killed and 62 prisoners.

The Daily Telegraph's Constantinople correspondent says: The Porte refuses to permit the exportation from Turkey, of mules, for British service in Egypt. Lord Dufferin states that this is a contravention of treaty rights and has addressed a strong protest to the Porte, stating that Turkey will be responsible for heavy damages.

The Celtic Conference in Session.

The conference of delegates from the Celtic Conference was held at Dublin on the 21st inst. Justin McCarthy, member of Parliament for Longford, presided. On motion of Mr. Sexton, member of Parliament for Sligo, an executive committee was formed, including representatives of the Irish Parliamentary party and prominent members of the Land League.

Rome to Ireland.

A letter from the Pope to the Irish Bishops, dated August 1, is published in His Holiness, expressing his profound regret that tranquility has not been restored in Ireland and that murders continue to be committed.

Personal.

JUDGE JAMES, of Nova Scotia, has been sworn in as Judge in Equity. MR. LONG, the American Consul, was assaulted by Arabs in Alexandria. ADMIRAL NICHOLSON denies the report that he notified the Egyptians he would reply in kind if they fired on his ships.

FOUR prominent Reformers of North Hastings, Ont., are to be proceeded against for corrupt practices.

THE Pall Mall Gazette strongly denounces the sentence passed on Mr. Dwyer Gray as a scandal of the first magnitude.

THE Customs Department have, it is understood, added a number of special detectives to the force already employed, with a view of more effectually checking smuggling across the border in the future.

YELLOW FEVER.—The reports of this disease in many Southern ports, have induced the health officer in New York to make careful preparations to enforce through quarantine.

A MORTGAGE deed of \$1,140,000, said to be the largest individual mortgage on record, was executed in New York, last week.

SEARCHES for arms in Ireland are generally fruitless. The weapons, well-greased, are wrapped in what may be called waterproof paper, and buried in a tiled field, the owner alone knowing the precise spot, as crop is grown upon it.

MGR. N. Z. LORRAIN, of Ottawa, has received the Papal bull appointing him Bishop of Cythera in partibus and Vicar-General of Pontiac. His consecration will probably take place on the 21st September.

IN the township of Guysborough, N. S., there are 440 inhabitants, comprising 88 families. There are 30 families with only three persons in each family. There are 20 persons 70 to 90 years of age, and twenty persons 60 to 70 years of age.

A YOUNG lady in Toronto, named Priestly was to have been married in Toronto, on Tuesday, her lover coming from Texas to claim her, but she died last Tuesday of typhoid fever, and her funeral was postponed to permit the attendance of her lover.

At a recent English wedding the bridesmaids wore dresses of pale primrose surah, with broad brown silk sashes and sprays of wild flowers and hats to match; they each carried a bouquet of wild flowers, also an ivory mounted fan, presented by the bride groom and painted by the bride.

THE census of 1874 showed that in Newfoundland there were 18,935 children attending school. This gave an attendance at school of about one in eight of the population. The population is now 185,000, and the number now in attendance is 24,971, or about one in seven of the population.
