British Pilots Show Off Fastest Aviation Advances

FARNBOROUGH, England (AP) — Britain Tuesday threw open its aircraft show windows to thousands of potential buyers and Western Military guests.

After Monday's rainy preview, the annual Air Trade Show officially began in a blaze of sunshine and fine flying weather for Britain's ace pilots to show off the country's latest aviation advances.

Within an hour of the opening, Vickers announced a £600,000 order for two of its prop-jet Viscount airliners, bringing the total number of Viscounts ordered by airlines to 236. The orders are valued at £67,000,000.

Prime Minister Eden headed the list of visitors and accepted an invitation to make a flight in Vulcan Delta bomber today. He said he would like to fly in the Delta bomber "as long as you don't roll."

He strolled among the aircraft parked wing-tip to wing-tip. Although the aircraft were lined up on the tarmac for all the world to see, some were roped off to prevent too close an inspection.
