SUMMERSIDE — After first denying that he had resigned as chairman of the Summerside School Board, W. Chester S. MacDonald, yesterday confirmed that he had tendered his resignation to the Executive Council. However, he said that he had not been officially informed that the government had accepted his resignation. Mr. MacDonald, who has been chairman of the school board for the past three years, pointed out that any new appointment would have to be made by the provincial government, and any announcement in this regard would likely be made by the provincial minister of education, Hon. George Dewar.

SUMMERSIDE — "Orders are coming in as fast as the phone can ring," said Miss Blanche Hogg, employment supervisor at the Summerside national employment office yesterday regarding the placing of potato pickers in the Prince County area. With the exception of Summerside high school, all other high schools in this area are closed for the week to permit students to aid in the potato harvesting operations. Miss Hogg said the employment office has already placed many high school students, a number of whom are from Summerside, in the potato fields. 'Side Council Approves Changes in Bond Issue
SUMMERSIDE BUREAU OF THE GUARDIAN reported that the Summerside Council has approved changes in the bond issue. The council, which met on Oct. 15, decided to increase the bond issue from \$1.4 million to \$1.6 million. This increase is necessary to cover the cost of new equipment and to provide for future expansion. The council also approved a resolution providing for a 5% increase in the bond issue over the next five years. The changes were approved by a vote of 12 to 2. The council will now proceed to issue the bonds and to begin construction of the new equipment.

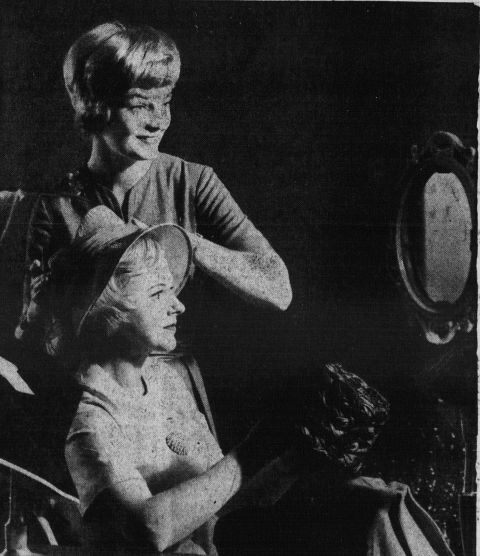
WAGES INCREASED
LONDON (AP)—The British Ford Motor Company has granted a pay raise of 24 an hour to 45,000 workers in hopes of ending wildcat strikes. The package deal will add an average of 10c (\$1.50) a week to the workers' average of around \$21 (\$65) a week.
