Canadiens Shut Out Bruins 4-0

MONTREAL (CP) — The incomparable Maurice (Rocket) Richard came back to the hockey wars Thursday night and helped himself to two goals in Montreal Canadiens' 4-0 shutout of Boston Bruins while a season-record crowd of 14,528 roared in acclaim.

It was Richard's first appearance since Nov. 13 when he suffered an almost-severed Achilles tendon.

Despite occasional evidence of some unsteadiness in his underpinning, the colorful 36-year-old veteran was again the alert opportunist. He appeared to favor his right foot at times and was none too sure of himself when cutting sharply to the right on his right skate.

MELBOURNE (AP) — Despite a heavy cold, 13-year-old Lisa Konrads broke her own world record for 880 yards by 1.5 seconds Thursday night in winning the Australian Women's freestyle swimming championship.

The slender, Latvian-born blonde won by 60 yards in 10 minutes, 16.2 seconds. It was the 11th world record performance chalked up in the championships in the 55-year Olympic pool.

Gerda Zevenboom, 15-year-old Dutch girl swimming for South Australia, was second in 11:13.5. Christine O'Farrell was third in 11:16.1.

Island Rink Tied With N. Ontario For 'Spical Lead

Showing their heels to their opponents during the middle stages of the game, Prince of Wales College kept Prince Edward Island in the thick of the running for the Dominion School Boys Curling Bonselpiel title last night when they romped to an easy 15-7 win over Ontario in the ninth round of play.

The Ontario crew greatly assisted the day by dropping a previously undefeated Northern Ontario. Going into the final two rounds of play the boys from the Island are in a deadlock for first place in the runnings with Northern Ontario. Winner of this afternoon's game will gain undisputed possession when the two rinks meet at two o'clock.

Northern Ontario continued their roughshot treatment of the other teams in the league when they walloped New Brunswick 15-5 in another ninth round match. Other games saw Saskatchewan drop a stone in the final end to eke out a 7-6 win over Quebec, Alberta following a fast start, dropped their fourth straight game, a 14-8 decision to British Columbia, and Nova Scotia, with two big ends in the fifth and sixth, carried off a 10-6 triumph over Newfoundland. The loss by the squad from Canada's 10th province was their ninth of the tournament. They have yet to taste the fruits of victory in this their first year of play in the cross-Canada spiel.

LARGEST CROWD
Playing before the largest crowd to witness the bonselpiel to date, the Prince Edward Island crew were the center of attraction in their game with Ontario on the No. 3 ice sheet.

Skipper Burke had his charges up for the big test and opened up a three stone lead in the first end. The Ontario crew, representatives of the city of Welland, came back with two in the second end but dropped far off the pace when the Islanders scored three more in the third. The Ontario crew halved the total with a single in the fourth but dropped back again as P.E.I. picked up singletons in each of the fifth and sixth ends and then put the game out of reach with four in the seventh, one in the eighth and finished up with a two end in the ninth.
