



Top Spot Giants Edged By Cubs In Own Back Yard

After pulling off a first-inning triple play, Chicago Cubs proved they have some right to their position in the National League's first division, edging front-running San Francisco Giants 5-4 Sunday in the Giants' home park.

The win left the Cubs tied with Milwaukee Braves one-half game back of the Giants.

Saturday the Giants topped the Cubs 3-1.

The Braves meanwhile dropped the last game of their series with Philadelphia Phillies 6-2 Sunday. Saturday they doubled the score on the Phils, 4-2.

WIN FIRST SERIES
Los Angeles Dodgers won their first series of the year, two-games-to-one, as they walloped St. Louis Cardinals 10-3 Sunday before 44,941 fans at the Coliseum. Saturday, the Cards won, 6-4.

Pittsburgh Pirates defeated Cincinnati Reds 8-4 Saturday, and had their twin-bill rained out Sunday.

Rain played a large part in the Sunday games in the American League.

Two doubleheaders were rained out and the second half of another had to be cancelled.

TRAMPLE WHITE SOX
Kansas City Athletics trampled Chicago White Sox 7-1 and then were rained out in two games Sunday. The result left the Athletics one game back of first-place New York Yankees.

The Yanks blanked Baltimore Orioles 2-0 Saturday and were in turn rained out in a double-header Sunday.

Cleveland Indians and Detroit Tigers are tied after the weekend, two games behind the Yanks. The Indians defeated the Tigers 4-1 Saturday and then resumed 9-5 Sunday in the first game of a scheduled twin-bill. The second game was postponed by rain.

Washington Senators stopped Boston Red Sox 7-5 Saturday, but on Sunday, the Sox turned around and took the Nats by the same score, 7-5. The results left the Senators tied in the cellar with Chicago, five games off the pace.

TRIPLE PLAY
The Cubs' triple play came in the first inning with Willie Kirkland on second and Willie Mays on first. Hank Sauer cranked a line shot and the runners were off. But Dick Drott, the Cubs' starting pitcher, caught the ball, wheeled and threw to Tony Taylor — for two — and Taylor whipped out to Dale Long for the third out.

Mays, halfway down the base line, put on the brakes — but didn't have a chance.

Long smashed a 400-foot homer in the second to put the Cubs ahead. Ernie Banks double in the eighth was the blow that started the Cubs' late rally that actually won the game.

At Milwaukee, Jack Sanford held the Braves to five hits Sunday and Richie Ashburn hit his first home run in two years.

Low Burdette isated only five innings, suffering his second defeat in three decisions.

The Red Sox built up a seven-run lead and hung on to down the Senators Sunday. Boston started things on Frank Malzone's first home of the year in the second inning. They added three in the fifth and three more in the sixth.

Clyde Wins Soccer Cup

LONDON (CP)—Clyde won its second Scottish Football Association cup in four years Saturday with a 1-0 victory over Hibernian.

Two Second Division English League clubs found themselves in the First Division as the soccer season neared its close.

Moving up in the English League's First Division annual switch, were the two top clubs of the Second Division — West Ham United and Blackburn Rovers.

West Ham clinched the division championship with a 3-1 victory over Middlesbrough. Blackburn squeaked by Charlton, a team which would have won the promotion with even a tie in Saturday's play, with a 4-3 win.

Moving down from the First Division to make room for the upstarts were Sunderland and Sheffield Wednesday, the division's last-place team.

Most clubs now have completed their season's program but a few mid-week matches remain. The season officially ends next Saturday with the cup final between Bolton Wanderers and Manchester United.

Wolverhampton Wanderers, who clinched the First Division title a week ago Saturday lost 2-1 to Sheffield as the last-place team went out of the First Division in a blaze of glory.

Four Names Stand Apart In Derby

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP)—There are four names that stand apart in the 84th running of the famed Kentucky Derby under the twin spires of historic Churchill Downs Saturday. They are Silky Sullivan, Tim Tam, Jewel's Reward and Nadir.

Massed bands will play My Old Kentucky Home at 4:30 p.m. Central Daylight Time, and mint julep glasses will be set aside momentarily as the horses line up in the gate.

The lure of Silky Sullivan, the "Flying Irishman," may bring out a record crowd if the weather is right.

Millions will line up in front of television sets (CBS, 4:15 to 4:45 p.m. EST) to look in on the great thoroughbred show.

The field may have anywhere from 14 to 18 three-year-olds. The number will be vital for Silky Sullivan, the come-from-last California sensation. A large field will be all the tougher for Silky to manoeuvre through.

Silky usually lays behind, then shifts gears and takes after the others as he did when he won the Santa Anita Derby for his co-trainer, Tom Ross and Philip Klipstein. He'll meet much stiffer company in this classic 1¼ mile battle.

Another question involves Tim Tam, from the Claiborne Farm of Mrs. Gene Markey and Jewel's Reward from the Maine Chance Farm of Mrs. Elizabeth N. Graham.

Jewel's Reward finished first in the Flamingo at Hialeah last winter, but was disqualified for bumping Tim Tam half-a-dozen times in the stretch drive. What will the answer be this time?

NADIR IMPROVING
Nadir, like Silky, is a big horse, and apparently is improving after an illness that knocked him out in December. Nadir won the world's richest race, the \$277,150 Garden State stakes as a two-year-old last October. He is owned by the Claiborne Farm of A. B. (Bull) Hancock.

Tim Tam, Nadir, George Lewis' Martins Rullah, winner of the Experimental handicap, and others will hook up Tuesday in the derby trial stakes, at one mile.
