AMONG THE FARMERS

Federation of Agriculture Newsletter

ON THE LAND The weather has finally relented and allowed the impatient farmer to begin cropping. The 8-hour day and the 40-hour week will not mean very much to the ruralist for the next few weeks. The 40 hours will be filled in nearly every case before the end of the third day and the work which starts early in the morning will continue late into the night. In the potato era of the horses, cultivation could be done in daylight hours, now with the blessing of mechanization many farmers arrange to do a full day's work and then after night, will continue pushing the tractor or may be it is that the tractor is pushing them — we are not quite sure. The land is working up in excellent shape, some sowing of grain has been done, manure spreading is well advanced and everywhere truck loads of fertilizer are being rushed through to the province. The grass is still retarded and the few cattle that have been turned out to pasture must keep busy if they are going to get a fill. The early grass is high in quality, but if grazed on too early, future development is retarded. The potato grower will in many cases be undecided whether or not to plant a few extra acres, the past few springs have produced encouraging prices, will it happen again next year or will there be an easier dollar in selling this spring's high priced seed on the chances that prices will be generally low in the coming year. Added to the great amount of work the farmer must accomplish in the next few weeks is the problem of financing the purchase of seed, fertilizer, gas, and parts, in some cases an important implement may suddenly arrive in a spongy and an unexpected expenditure must be dealt with as a result. For those who do not like to be idle, in a mixed farm for the next few months has a great deal to recommend it. FARM FORUM PROSPECTS The annual meeting of the Provincial Farm Forum Committee took place earlier in the week and through the Secretary's report learned that forum activities have fallen off through the past year. Not too much time was spent by the committee in considering this situation, but attention was directed to improving the situation for the coming year. A decision was made to support a workshop in the Maritime provinces which will be instrumental in developing public interest. The proposed workshop will be held early in October and will be followed by whatever field work will be necessary to renew interest and activity in farm forums. During the course of the meeting an interesting discussion took place with respect to study clubs in the '30's and at the present time. In the '30's interest in kitchen meetings was a very high level, but people had to stay with it as there was no employment to be found in other areas, today while agricultural conditions are difficult other industries offer employment and better prospects. This young people and farm operators bring to their farm problems is to walk, drive or fly away from them to Central Canada where the work day is shorter, week-end longer and the pay presumably higher. There is possibly no good reason why any young man should be expected to martyr himself to an unprofitable and unrewarding farm. This may be the case when there are no other alternatives but today the alternatives are numerous and in many cases inviting. U. S. DUMPS BUTTER New Zealand has protested formally against what it calls the dumping of surplus United States dairy products in the world market. New Zealand Ambassador to United States, Sir Leslie Munro, informed the U. S. Government that his country felt great concern over the United States butler disposal. He said the United States has invaded the Western European butter market. New Zealand, Ambassador Munro said, has lost sales to France and Germany and probably Portugal, as a result of United States disposals of butter. BUTTER IN BRITAIN The British continue to eat more margarine than butter. It is estimated that British are eating about 17.8 pounds of margarine per person per year and about 14.7 pounds of butter. In prewar days, the British ate an average of 24.7 pounds of butter per person and 8.7 pound of margarine. During 1955, butter gained a

Six Wire-Fence Firms Fined

TORONTO (CP)—The Supreme Court of Ontario levied fines totaling \$60,000 Wednesday against six wire-fence companies convicted of running a combine for 18 years. Mr. Justice Wilfred Judson also said he feels the firms should pay costs but he has no power so to order because of the revised Criminal Code that became effective April 1, 1955. Fines of \$10,000 were levied against the Dominion Steel and Coal Company, Ltd., and its subsidiary, Canadian Steel Corporation, Ltd.; the Steel Company of Canada and its subsidiary, Frost Steel and Wire Company, Ltd.; and two smaller firms, Lundy Fence Company, Ltd., and the New Brunswick Wire Fence Company, Ltd. The companies were accused of operating the combine between January, 1933, and December, 1953.

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DAIRY MONTH
