Worst Highway Tragedy of the Year in Quebec Province Claimed Nine Lives



Nine persons met flaming death when a car and a light delivery truck collided head-on eight miles from Drummondville, Que. Seven of the victims—on a pilgrimage to St. Joseph's oratory in Montreal—died when their car, seen above, was up-ended by the impact and burst into flames. Police said all were knocked unconscious and trapped in the blazing overturned car. Two others in truck, which was said to have rammed down the wrong side of a straight road and into the car, were thrown clear of the vehicle. Investigation into the worst highway tragedy of the year for Quebec Province, revealed that occupants of the truck had been drinking.
