Dredging Of Montague River Gets Underway

With the usual group of kibitzers, the dredge PWD115 swung into action this week to dredge out the Montague River. It has been some 15 years since the river has been completely dredged, but this year will see the completion of a long delayed work. Besides the dredge under the command of Capt. James Keddy, there are also the tugs Canso and Pugwash, under the command of Capt. G. Campbell and C. MacLean. The river has been surveyed to provide a 14-foot channel, necessitating several cuts. The first course of 2900 ft. will require six cuts from Stevens Wharf to Government Wharf and thereafter four cuts through remainder of first course, the second course of 1420 feet, and third course of 2900 feet.

Each cut is 36 feet wide, giving a completed width of 144 feet. The dredge takes 35 minutes to load each scow with 300 yards of mud, which is then taken seven miles to sea where it is dumped. Mr. A. Poirier, the engineer operating the bucket and crane, shows himself to be a master of the art, giving his audience a worthy show. The need for this work has been apparent for several years since heavy ships have found it difficult to enter the port. With this increased depth in the channel, it will be easier for such ships to come in, thereby increasing trade for this community, a trade which has been in danger of falling off owing to the heavy silt filling in the channel.

Unwed Mother's Logic

KIDDERMINSTER, Worcester-shire, England, July 9. (CP) - Things are being made too easy for unmarried mothers, says Canon R. B. Jolly, vicar of Kidderminster. "The state has made it easier for an unmarried mother to have her child, but it does not touch the all-important matter of the girl's redemption," said the vicar.

"Illegitimate children, once an encumbrance to the mother, now get \$65 (\$5.57) a week maternity allowance," he said.

The vicar is especially interested in unmarried mothers of 15 and 16. In his opinion, these girls have no sense of shame.

A welfare worker told a moral welfare committee that one unmarried mother had said to her: "Why should we be blamed for producing babies for those who can't?"

"This sense of pride in having produced a beautiful baby is not making our work of redemption any easier," said the canon.

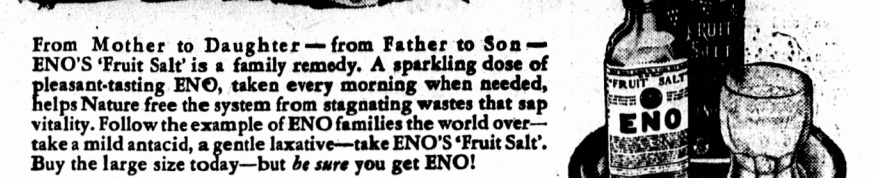

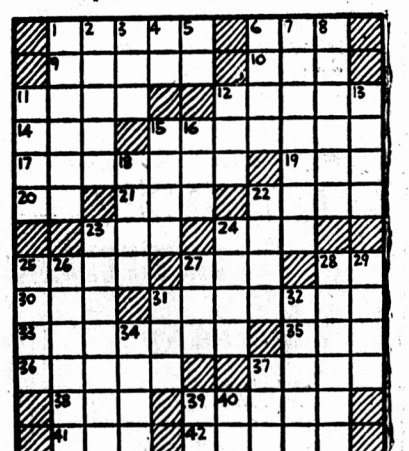
