A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS the Persons exercising the Supreme Authority in France having declared War against his Majesty, on the first of February last, and the King's Commands having been signified to me, instantly to cause the same to be made as public as possible in the Island under my Government,

I have therefore thought fit, by and with the Advice and Consent of his Majesty's Council, to issue this Proclamation, in Order to make known the same, that his Majesty's Subjects, having this Notice, may take Care, on the one Hand; to prevent any Mischief which otherwise they might suffer from the French, and, on the other, may do their utmost, in their several Stations, to distress and annoy them, by making Capture of their Ships; and by destroying their Commerce; for which Purpose his Majesty has been pleased to order LETTERS OF MARQUE, OF COMMISSIONS OF PRIVATEERS, to be granted in the usual Manner.

And the Owners of all armed Ships may rest assured, that his Majesty will consider them as having a just Claim to the King's Share of all French Ships and Property, which they may make Prize of.

A Proclamation.

WHEREAS the General Assembly of this Island stands prorogued to Tuesday the fourth Day of June, Instant,

I have therefore thought fit, by and with the Advice of his Majesty's Council, further to prorogue the said GENERAL ASSEMBLY, and the same is hereby prorogued to Tuesday the fifth Day of November next, then to meet at Charlotte Town for the Dispatch of Public Business; of which all Persons concerned are required to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

Given under my Hand and Seal at Arms, at the Council Chamber, in Charlotte Town, in the Island aforesaid, this first Day of June, in the Year of our Lord, One Thousand seven Hundred and Ninety-three, and in thirty-third Year of his Majesty's Reign.

GOD SAVE THE KING.

Boston, May 1.

By the President of the United States of America. A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS it appears, that a state of war exists between Austria, Prussia, Sardinia, Great Britain, and the United Netherlands of the one part, and France on the other, and the duty and interest of the United States require, that they should with sincerity and good faith adopt and pursue a conduct friendly and impartial towards the belligerent powers:

I have thought fit by these presents to declare the disposition of the United States to observe the conduct aforesaid towards those powers respectively; and to exhort and warn the citizens of the United States, carefully to avoid all acts and proceedings whatsoever, which may in any manner tend to contravene such disposition.

And I do hereby also make known, that whosoever of the citizens of the United States shall render himself liable to punishment or forfeiture under the law of nations, by committing, aiding or abetting hostilities against any of the said powers, or by carry-

ing to any of them those articles, which are deemed contraband by the modern usage of nations, will not receive the protection of the United States against such punishments or forfeiture; and further, that I have given instructions to those officers, to whom it belongs, to cause prosecution to be instituted against all persons, who shall, within the cognizance of the Courts of the United States, violate the law of nations, with respect to the powers at war, or any of them.

In Testimony whereof, I have caused the seal of the United States of America to be affixed to these Presents, and signed the same with my hand. Done at the City of Philadelphia the 22d day of April, 1793, and of the Independence of the United States of America the seventeenth.
