IS BUTCHERING AND MEAT CURING A NEW INDUSTRY?

Sir,—Our City Council have power, in the words of the Act of Incorporation, "to grant exemptions from taxation to any new industries coming into the city and not in existence at the time an application for exemption is made." Beyond this they are absolutely powerless. Is the killing, curing and shipping of meats a new industry in Charlottetown? Have we not several large establishments amongst us combining every one of these features? If so, can it be said that such industry is "not in existence at the time an application for exemption is made"? In no sense can the business upon which the Messrs. Battenbury ask the City Council for ten to twelve thousand dollars, or its equivalent, be called a new industry. On the contrary, it is the oldest, most prominent and most important in our city. It is said that this establishment is to be conducted under new methods, and aided by more modern appliances. But this will not meet the legal requirement. The industry itself must be a new one, not the machinery nor the methods of management. The Council, therefore, cannot grant exemption in the writer's opinion—it is beyond their power. Had Messrs. Jones & Melrose, the pioneer fruit canners, made an application of this kind, their position would have been more formidable. It is for such as this that the Act was intended.

Of what benefit would this proposed packing establishment prove to the city? At present the farmer kills his pork, brings it to town, converts it into cash, and which he pays his bills or makes necessary purchases, thus circulating the money amongst us. The buyer cuts, cures, packs and ships the product, giving employment to labor, teamsters, and indirectly to mechanics, thus benefiting the community in many ways. Under the new proposition, the live hog is bought at the country station, and the animal brought to town by rail and disposed of by machinery with a reduced number of hands, and loaded directly into the cars without the truckman's assistance, and exported. The Messrs. Battenbury are entitled to credit for their business shrewdness in this matter, but the citizens of Charlottetown, who have nothing to gain but community loss, cannot be expected to voluntarily tax themselves heavily for any purpose. The citizens look to the City Council to observe the law and safeguard their interests in this matter.

NEWS NOTES

The London Globe urges the government to accede to Canada's request to establish permanent in the Dominion a depot for the Old Royal Canadian Regiment, and says: "Apart from the injustice caused when all connection between the regiment and its birthplace was severed, the proposal to relieve sensibly the resources of the motherland would be an important step towards realizing imperial defence."

A despatch from Brass, on the west coast of Africa, gives details relative to the capture on February 18th of Benin City by the Royal Niger company's expedition against the Emir of Nupur. There was eighteen hours' running fight, and a stubborn resistance on the part of the Eulafas. Four of the whites, including Dr. Frye, were killed and sixteen wounded. The expedition found Benin city reeking with human blood.
