### Man Fined On Five Charges of Uttering

**SUMMERSIDE** — A Summerside woman, Doris Thelma Hardy, was fined and costs on each of five separate charges of uttering forged documents, which appeared before Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald in Prince County Magistrate's court yesterday morning.

Mrs. Hardy had appeared some time ago on these charges and at that time sentence had been pronounced.

Since her last appearance Mrs. Hardy received treatment at Riverside Hospital and was asking for a light fine defence counsel Alex Campbell said that both the hospital official, Mr. and Mrs. Hardy felt the problem had been surmounted.

Even presented agreed to the light fine and stated that the problem must have been a sudden change in her mind.

Ronald Joseph Greenan, Charlottetown, was fined guilty of speeding and fined \$10 and costs. Acting for the accused was Alex Campbell.

Charged with leaving for fishing the grounds with lobster gear more than 16 hours before the season opened, Amos Lloyd Perry was fined \$10 and costs.

It was stated that the accused had only gone as far as the lighthouse and waited for the remainder of the fishing boat before proceeding any further.

Fishermen were allowed to lay their traps no more than 16 hours before the season opened but the accused left the wharf some 20 minutes ahead of the other fishermen.

Appearing on a similar charge, Cpl. Roy Souter, Summerside, was fined \$20 and costs. Acting for the crown, G. Bruce MacDonald stated that the accused instead of stopping at the lighthouse and waiting for the other fishing boats, had proceeded right to the fishing grounds.

A Tyne Valley youth, Melvin Francis Marchbanks, who had earlier pleaded guilty to a charge of illegal possession of liquor, was remanded in custody until this morning, Friday by Magistrate MacDonald. Having been asked where he had obtained the liquor the accused answered a man had bought it for him at the "vendora".

When asked who the man was the accused said he didn't know and Magistrate MacDonald said by now will continue to be remanded until you show some cooperation."

The case of Cecil William Skerry, MacNells Mills, charged with knowingly supplying liquor to a person under the age of 21, was adjourned to Oct. 21 for trial.

Charged under the Excise Act of being in possession of illicit spirits, Patrick Leonard Jones had his case adjourned for decision to Oct. 22 following the testimony of three crown witnesses.

# American Defence System Is Outlined

Manned bomber defences in the RCAF's contribution to NORAD are divided among the distant early warning line, the mid-range radar area and the area of contiguous radar coverage. Air Commodore A.C. Hull told members of the RCAF Association meeting yesterday afternoon.

Commodore Hull, chief of staff at air defence command headquarters, was addressing the RCAF 15th anniversary convention being held in Charlottetown.

The DEW line, he said, consists of six main stations approximately 60 miles apart and 23 auxiliary or slave stations approximately 50 miles apart. The line is a composite of search radars and a doppler feed.

The mid-Canada line, situated along the 55th parallel consists of 29 doppler detection stations and three section control stations. This system is capable of providing numbers and approximate directions of penetrating aircraft.

Air defence command operates 20 long range radars stretching from coast to coast in the area of contiguous radar coverage, he said.

The defence command's contribution to the active defence of the North American continent is a composite of search radars, the nuclear equipped Bomarc B surface to air missile and simulated enemy bomber force has been developed, he said to insure the system is in top working order all the time, and to enable evaluation of its effectiveness particularly under electronic jamming conditions.
