Army Statistics.

Among the 86,000 non-commissional officers and men constituting the British home army on the 1st of January, and including all young soldiers, were under 5 feet 5 inches in height 10,622; between that and 5 feet 6 inches, 11,944; between 5 feet 6 inches and 5 feet 7 inches there were 15,810, and nearly the same number, or 15,490 5 feet 8 inches or an inch under; between 5 feet 8 inches and 5 feet 9 inches there were 12,763; between 5 feet 9 inches and 5 feet 10 inches and 5 feet 11, 5,373.
