

UN Model Parliament Speaker Sees World Becoming Socialistic

Rev. Gordon R. Taylor, MA, was guest speaker at the First Prince Edward Island Model United Nations General Assembly held Saturday at Montgomery Hall. Rev. Taylor, minister at the Kirk of St. James, spoke on the problems of East Asia. "Because of the Oriental concept of the family," he said, "the communist ideas of responsibility appeal to them. Chinese philosophers thought it quite right for revolution; but the Chinese have an innate respect for those in authority."

Rev. Taylor also spoke on education in China; "Gross illiteracy of the Chinese people is a problem, but within 10 years, 90 per cent of the Chinese people will be literate. Russian communism is becoming less and less Marxist and a peculiar form of Platonism is taking its place, particularly in education."

The speaker closed by stating that "the world will become socialist, and the Communist

countries will become less Marxist." Rev. Taylor also expressed the wish that the form of socialism would be Christian.

58 DELEGATES

Sally Martin, president of the PWC association and secretary of the model assembly welcomed the 58 delegates from 17 island schools, to the assembly. The assembly was called to order by David Raynor, president of the assembly, and the delegates stood for one minute of silent meditation for peace throughout the world.

Gary MacLeod, delegate from Albania, introduced a two-part resolution calling for Red China's admission to the UN, withdrawal of Nationalist China from the UN and replacement of Nationalist China by the People's Republic of China in all organs of the UN including the security council. The motion was seconded by Soviet Foreign Minister Peter MacKinnon.

The motion was protested by Tony Marley, delegate from Na-

tionalist China, but the protest was ruled out of order. The United Kingdom delegate, Michael LeBlanc, amended the motion, but it was defeated after two re-votes. The final defeat came because the assembly was one vote short of the necessary two-thirds majority.

Delegates and observers sat in on discussion groups on the situation in Viet Nam. Discussion group leaders were Rev. P. W. P. Bolger, Douglas Boylon, Pamela Keirstead, and Mrs. Janet Baker.

Dr. Frank MacKinnon, president of Prince of Wales College, welcomed the delegates to the assembly at a banquet Saturday evening and the assembly closed with a "meet the delegates" dance Saturday evening.

Two Accidents Injure Four

In the second accident, about 11 o'clock, involving cars driven by Joseph Perry of Tignish and Peter Buots also of Tignish. Buots was taken to hospital in Alberton for treatment of lacerations and a passenger, Alfred Buots, remained in hospital for further examination.

Both accidents were investigated by Alberton detachment of the RCMP.

A number of persons have questioned the importing of United States picnic hams, now on sale in many island stores at about 35 cents a pound when the province is such a heavy producer of the product.

Government agricultural and marketing authorities however, say the province is part of a deficiency area as far as pork is concerned and not enough can be raised to meet the overall demand.
