## U. S. Planning Biggest H-Bomb Test This Year

WASHINGTON (AP) — Congressional sources said Saturday the U.S. Atomic Energy Commission plans its most powerful hydrogen bomb blast in a test this year in the Pacific.

These sources said the record blast will be part of a series of tests now being organized by chairman Lewis L. Strauss of the Atomic Energy Commission.

Strauss has made no formal announcement on the test even to members of the joint congressional atomic committee but it was learned the demonstrations will be in the Eniwetok testing area in the Pacific.

There was speculation that the explosion might be from two to three times the size of the one produced by the United States in 1954, the greatest ever produced.

## "Ham" Operators Perform Yeoman Service In Crisis

When telegraphic and telephone communication throughout the Maritime Provinces failed during the radio sleet storm, the amateur operators stepped into the breach to perform yeomanlike service in keeping communications open to communities isolated by power failure.

Nine operators throughout the Province have stood by their sets for long weary hours passing vital messages from various points on the island and with the mainland.

The Canadian National Railway Telegraphs, which suffered heavy damage, were given great assistance by the amateur operators.

Between Borden and Charlottetown the line was completely out and a special train which set out from Charlottetown on Saturday with the intention of stringing an emergency line, met with little success as the quick forming ice broke the link as soon as it was put up.

A "ham" operator at Borden and one at Charlottetown sent and received messages sufficient to keep traffic moving on this busy part of the Island Division.

On Saturday afternoon, Stewart Smith with his mobile unit VE1ZM was dispatched to Summerside where he kept a lia. with the stricken western town which was completely without power or telephone communications.

Operating the Island net work control was Fulton Proude VE1KZ. In his central position at Charlottetown he was able to relay messages and give general directions to the other operators.

Lloyd DesRoches, a member of the reserve army, VE1KZ mobile, operated a set from Borden and kept the terminal in touch with Charlottetown, at the same time keeping in touch with Summerside.

Walter Hyndman, VE1BZ, Charlottetown handled the traffic on the Maritime network and received and passed valuable information between here and the mainland.

Doug Mosher VE1AL of Charlottetown operated from his own home and later when a set was installed in the train dispatcher's office, he operated from the railway depot here.

Clifford Stewart VE1GR operated his set in Charlottetown at one point outside where he was required.

## City Suffers From Heavy Rainfall During Weekend

The precipitation of 1.15 inches of rain which fell during the period from Friday to Sunday morning, coupled with the heavy thaw, caused a great deal of damage throughout the city. A large number of cellars were flooded in various parts, and cut by flooding.

One plumbing business in the city reported that they were called out to pump more cellars than at any time during the past two years. Several people who had had furnaces converted to the automatic oil burners, hastily replaced grates and returned to burning coal and wood.

To cut down the possibilities of water backing up in the Spring Park area and causing serious damage, city workmen opened the gates of Government Pond early Sunday morning. The new large drainage outlet which was installed in the Spring Park area last year greatly reduced the possibility of flooding as was experienced a few years ago.

The section of east Grafton St., near the CNR crossing showed no signs of flooding, due to the larger run off pipes which were installed during the summer.

City employees were kept busy clearing away an unestimated number of fallen trees from various sections of the city. In Victoria Park the damage to trees, mainly the birches, was very heavy. The work of cleaning up the debris will take city workmen several days. The main cause of tree damage was mostly the weight of accumulated ice, and not the wind, which generally had a velocity of from twelve to twenty m.p.h. with gusts Saturday and Sunday morning of twenty-eight and thirty.

During the greater part of the storm, the Fire Department kept additional men on duty, due to the increased danger of fire. Saturday night and Sunday morning the Police Department maintained a double shift on duty.
