stage who could carry on without it.

NO MAJOR CRITICISM

I have no major criticism on interpretation," Prof. Shaw continued, and the grouping was very good, generally following the accepted basic triangular arrangement. He was particularly pleased with the team work of the Company, "in which obviously all worked together." He rated the tempo for the most part "first rate." Emphasis was also good and not just words from a printed page. He said, "Audibility and diction for the most part was quite satisfactory, but he noted a tendency towards small gestures which were ineffectual."

Prof. Shaw had difficulty in reconciling some of the youthful players with the mature and evaded roles in which they had been cast. "Stephen Dawlish (Ivan Dawlish) was interpreted quite good and he knew exactly what he was doing. His voice was very fine and his diction excellent, in giving the outstanding performance in the play," Professor Shaw said.

Christopher Dawlish (Derrill MacGuigan) had a difficult role and not too much to work with and Rosalie Dawlish, (Marjorie Coffin) "came across good with a great deal of vivacity and life." Mrs. Dawlish (Mary Moran), who portrayed a mystical character "made a good attempt and her diction was good."

Irina Shestova as played by Elizabeth Willett was rated as "Excellent" with nothing adverse attempted. "Her shading of character from cold hostility to a warmth of emotion covered all ranges while her movements were also excellent and without excess." Prof. Shaw said. Speaking informally over coffee and sandwiches following the performance, the audience derived much satisfaction in listening to his frank and present were given a splendid opportunity to compare their own reactions to the performance with those of an experienced adjudicator, thus adding to the enjoyment of the evening's entertainment.
