On Wednesday last an intoxicated rough named James McEachern entered the grocery store of James Byrne, Esq., C. C., Great George Street, and asked Mr. Byrne's brother Edward to sell him a bottle of liquor. This Mr. Byrne refused to do. McEachern, at his refusal, became violent, called the young man names, and threatened him with violence. In the midst of the wordy quarrel Mr. James Byrne entered, and in order to pacify McEachern he filled a bottle of brandy, gave it to him and told him to leave the store quietly. McEachern tendered him fifty cents in payment thereof, but Mr. Byrne informed him that as the C. T. Act was in force he could not receive money for liquor. McEachern left the store and shortly after made complaint at the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court that Mr. Byrne sold him liquor. A summons was issued against Mr. Byrne, and the case was tried this forenoon. McEachern testified that he bought the liquor from Mr. Byrne, and for it paid fifty cents. Mr. Byrne and his brother Edward, on the contrary, swore positively that McEachern never paid for the liquor, and that they gave it to him to order that he might leave their premises quietly without creating any disturbance. The Magistrate, in view of the above facts, dismissed the summons, and very properly acquitted Mr. Byrne. We have not heard what action the Court took in McEachern's case.

UNITED STATES.

NEW YORK, Oct. 5.

The State Republican Convention, today, nominated State officers, excepting Governor and Lieut. Governor. Resolutions were adopted deploring the death of President Garfield, and pledging themselves to grant the principles to which he was devoted; also expressing confidence in President Arthur.

GREAT BRITAIN AND IRELAND.

LONDON, Oct. 5.

Sir Stafford Northcote, speaking at Beverley yesterday, in alluding to land legislation for England, said the Conservatives would heartily support any proposal giving tenants security for improvements on their holdings.

LIVERPOOL, Oct. 5.

The City Council, to-day, which is holding the first sitting since the death of President Garfield, unanimously adopted resolutions of sympathy with the American people and the widow of the late President.

LONDON, Oct. 5.

Benjamin Scott, Chamberlain of London, and author of several antiquarian works, writes to the Times suggesting a practical method of giving enduring proof of English good will towards America, by an act which would exceedingly enrich Americans. There is in the Bishop of London's library at Fulham, a manuscript in the handwriting of Governor Biddford, one of the leading pilgrim fathers, who in 1820 landed at Plymouth Rock, Massachusetts, giving a diary of proceedings of the Pilgrims, containing the compact or constitution out of which arose the federation now termed the United States. The document was captured as lost by a British soldier during the American war of Independence, from the old Dutch church in Boston. Mr. Scott suggests that England present the document in the name of the Queen and nation to the United States.
