WHO WILL WIN?

The appointment of Sir Oliver Mowat to the office of Lieutenant Governor of Ontario will afford an opportunity to test the strength of Sir Louis Davies in the Laurier Cabinet. Sir Louis and his friends have good cause to expect that the Department of Justice will fall to his lot.

RECIPROCITY.

The Patriot contends that reciprocity with the United States is, in the near future, possible and probable. But it says: "The basis of reciprocity with the neighboring republic must be in regard to natural products."

The Patriot seems to forget that there was on the statute book of Canada for eighteen long years a "standing offer" of reciprocity upon the basis of "natural products," that the offer was persistently refused; and that it was laughed at by Sir Louis Davies and other members of the Liberal Party as absolutely nonsensical.

TAXES RAISED!

MANY of those who voted for the Peters Administration at the recent election are surprised to learn that their taxes have been raised. They refused to listen to THE EXAMINER'S warnings; they preferred to believe the assurances of Liberal canvassers that the Government would get at least a million dollars from Canada and that their taxes would be lowered.

The returns of the "Soo" Canal traffic up to September 2, 1897, were 2,811 vessels against 3,678 last season. The tonnage is 2,451,159 tons, compared with 3,308,244 in 1896, and the freight carried is 3,126,911 tons, where it was 3,360,790 last year up to the same date.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

The Conservatives are responsible for the Liberal deficit—so the Liberals all say! "Now, there will be no more deficits."—Nearly \$5,000,000 added to the debt of Canada last year. So much for the first year of Liberal government.

Premier Hardy, of Ontario having declared his belief that "whatever Mr Tarte may have been, we know that he is an honest man now, and that he has done no dishonest act since he has been in the Reform ranks," the Montreal Gazette says: "Mr. Hardy is evidently an anti corruptionist of the Laurier school. He does not see anything wrong in a job that helps the Liberal party."

ESTEEMED EXCHANGES.

Montreal Gazette says: Sir L.H. Davies, at Charlottetown, told an audience gathered to greet him that he only accepted a knighthood from the Queen at the unanimous request of his colleagues. Considering the much advertised democratic principles of his colleagues' such conduct on their part must be set down as disreputable.

Montreal Star: To the outsider who is not troubled with much respect for party tradition or the cramping sectionalism which plays too large a part in our politics, it would seem that the problem before the Premier would be great simplified if all this idea of allotting so many ministers to a province were abandoned, and then the possibility of reducing the number of departments frankly faced.

THE TEA MARKET.

Firm Advices From Primary Centres, Especially Japan! A leading broker writes:—"We think you will find on further enquiry that all advices from Japan for the past three weeks have been a steady advance in prices there, with a quick falling off in the quality of offerings. Many Canadian buyers, still say they expect a drop of 1c to 2c in teas, but where this is to come from those in close touch with Japan fail to see."

CANADIAN BACON.

Professor Robertson, as reported by the Montreal Herald, recently said that Canadian bacon is taking a relatively better place in the British markets than it has done hitherto. A great advance has been made during the last two years, and particularly during the current summer.
