## Wilson Optimistic On Peace Prospects

LONDON (AP)—Prime Minister Harold Wilson has suggested that "we should not be too quickly discouraged or too defeatist" about first Communist reactions tending to discount President Johnson's overtures for peace in Viet Nam.

"We have very warmly welcomed the speech of the president on the outlook in Southeast Asia," Wilson said. "It showed a clear and unequivocal willingness to enter into discussions

without preconditions. We would strongly support him in that, as we have in other aspects of the struggle in Southeast Asia. I particularly welcome the stress he has laid on economic reconstruction and rehabilitation. "We have had many discouragements on this question over the past few weeks and we should not be too quickly discouraged or too defeatist about first reactions to the president's proposals."

The prime minister, in an interview with The Associated Press, said Britain and the United States must tighten their alliance to check rising dangers to peace from Suez to the China Sea.

### RELEASE TRANSCRIPT

The interview took place last Tuesday just before Wilson went to Washington to see the president. The transcript was released Sunday after Wilson's office checked it, following the prime minister's return to Britain.

Wilson said "the balance of danger" is spreading more and more to Asia from Europe.

As this process goes on, the British leader continued, London and Washington will find it necessary "to talk closely together about any joint approach" needed to keep the peace and assure their friends east of Suez.

Among the points he made in answer to questions:

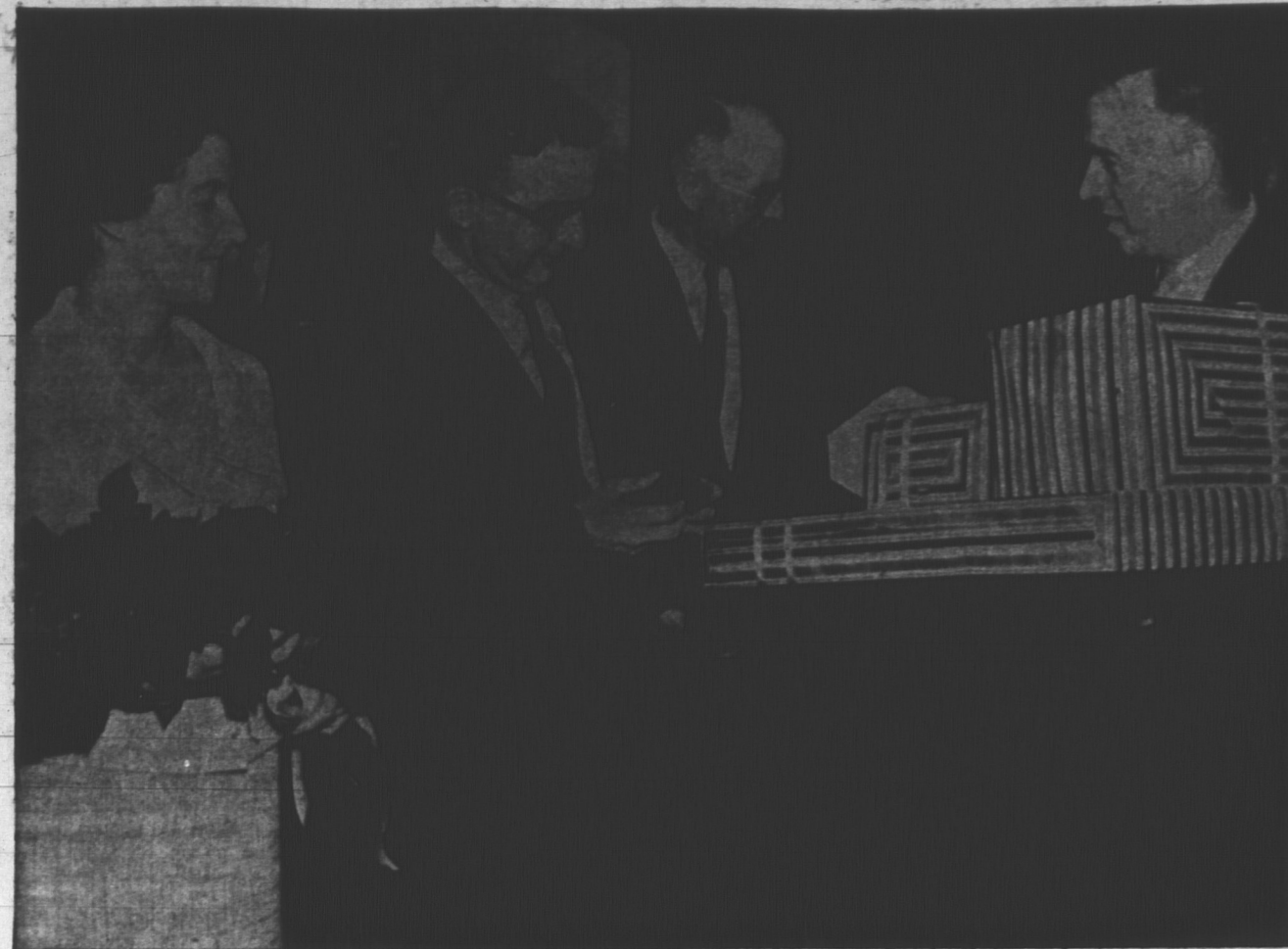
HALIFAX (CP) — The weather office says skies were cloudy in the southwestern part of the Maritimes late Sunday. Elsewhere skies were clear.

## Pope Urges Negotiations To End All War Operations

VATICAN CITY (AP)—Pope Paul VI appealed in his Easter message Sunday for a negotiated end to "every war and guerrilla operation" — a plea clearly aimed at the fighting in Viet Nam.

The 67-year-old pontiff also denounced racial strife and political and social oppression.

A half-million people braved

a cold wind and rain to hear the pope's message delivered in Italian at an outdoor mass in St. Peter's Square.

Speaking in a firm voice, the pontiff asked for rejoicing on this Christian feast day commemorating the resurrection of Christ. He said it should be a time of optimism, inspiring the world toward peace and justice, and the desire "of a new start in the history of man."

"And so, in the name and in the spirit of the risen Christ, may the day finally come on which men will put aside their false ideologies, urged on by their need for a new wisdom or because they have accepted this new wisdom which reveals man's true nature, as well as his true destiny."

**CALLS FOR NEGOTIATION**  
"May the day come on which the discords among peoples will be resolved, not with the force of arms but rather in the light of reasonable negotiations; and let every war and guerrilla operation give way to constructive collaboration which is mutual and fraternal."

"And may the day come on which the prodigious energies of progress will be employed to satisfy the world's hunger and to educate future generations, to bring remedies to the recurrent ills of mankind."

"And let there no longer be on this earth any of those deliberately caused and unprophetic sufferings due to systematic political and social oppression, to racial strife, to the contempt and restriction of the freedom of conscience and expression."

The Pope began Easter by driving 12 miles to St. Francis Village where he celebrated the first of two outdoor Easter masses. About 2,000 persons attended the service at the village, a workers' housing project built with Vatican contributions.

Back at the Vatican, he celebrated his second mass, a striking pontifical ceremony outdoors in St. Peter's Square.

Foreign tourists who came to Italy in the biggest Easter travel rush since the end of the Second World War swelled the crowd.

### Yank Planes Stage Raid Within 60 Miles Of Hanoi

SAIGON (AP)—Four propeller-driven U.S. Navy fighter-bombers flew within 60 miles of Hanoi Easter Sunday. They drew no opposition from Communist jets.

American planes flew 32 air strikes in South Viet Nam and three against the Communist north, including the probe shortly before midnight near the North Vietnamese capital.

A freak bomb explosion cost the life of a U.S. Air Force pilot during a strike against guerrilla targets within South Viet Nam. No other losses in American aircraft were reported in the raids.

The strikes against the north came from navy fighter-bombers from the U.S. carriers Midway and Hancock. In the first raid, 14 navy planes sank a ferry boat with cannon and rocket fire at Giap Tam about 60 miles north of the frontier, American spokesmen said early today.

Eleven other navy planes followed up this raid later in the day, streaking northward along Route 101 and pounding the Communists' Long Thanh army barracks in the same general area.
