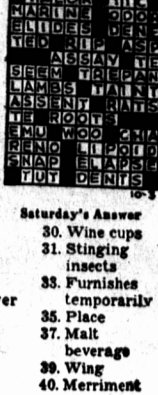

U. S. STEEL

CLEVELAND. (AP)—Some steel producers, fearful of being overbooked, are taking orders for only one month of the first quarter, Steel magazine reported Sunday.

Buyers are clamoring to get their orders on the books for first quarter delivery, but mills are cautious because they want to see how much car-over they will have, the magazine says.

Producers are counting on fourth-quarter shipments exceeding new orders and hope production will be on a current basis at the turn of the year. Shipments to the automobile industry will continue heavy in the last quarter because of the output of 1956 models.

Steel's figures show that ingot and casting production for 1955 will pass the 1954 output within 10 days. Preliminary figures for the first nine months of this year put production at 85,700,000 tons, only 2,600,000 tons short of the entire 1954 production. Current output is running at 2,300,000 tons the same pace as during the week.

Production last week maintained previous week—96 per cent of rated capacity.

Steel's price composite on Saturday's scrap climbed 67 cents to \$45 a gross ton while that on finished steel was unchanged.

Research By Car Makers May Lessen Deaths

NEW YORK (AP)—The ghastly highway toll is spurring the auto industry to stress safety devices.

Car makers can't keep motorists from running into each other, but industry spokesmen say that crash injuries when accidents happen can be cut by at least one third if safety devices to be offered with the 1956 models are used.

Car makers are teaming up with medical research experts to seek still further ways of cutting the death and injury toll on the highways.

Cornell University announces that Chrysler and Ford have each given \$200,000 to the automotive crash research program centered at the department of public health and preventive medicine of the university's medical college in New York City.

Cornell's studies show that 40 per cent of all injured drivers are hurt on the steering assembly. Ford engineers are demonstrating a deep-center safety steering wheel which slowly gives way under crash impact, distributing the shock over the driver's chest rather than letting him be impaled on the steering column as at present after the wheel collapses.

Indiana state police research shows that a passenger's chances of escaping injury in an accident are twice as great if he isn't thrown from the car by a crash. Auto engineers are coming out with new safety door latches which they say will keep doors from springing open under impact.

SEAT BELTS

Most of the new models will be equipped with—or can be equipped with—seat belts, much like those with which airplane passengers have long been familiar. These belts will help keep occupants inside the vehicle.

They also will cut down the chances of a passenger's being thrown against the instrument panel. Cornell research shows that 28 per cent of those injured in the front seat are hurt on the instrument panel.

Crash cushioning for the instrument panel and sun visors is being demonstrated by Ford engineers, who claim the padding is five times more shock absorbent than sponge, and distributes an impact over a wider area of the head or body.

A final device being shown is a safety rear-view mirror with a new backing which engineers say cuts the chance of glass falling out when shattered—a mishap that causes about four per cent of all injuries to front-seat passengers.

Will Kick Off

"It's not federal money we're after but our own."

Premier Douglas of Saskatchewan said he would like to see the rental pacts retained. He said he will propose a new way of computing the payments to give the provinces slightly higher payments.

Premier Matheson of Prince Edward Island said it would be a "serious situation" if double taxation returned. He would support renewal of the tax pacts.

Premier Duplessis of Quebec could be reached for comment. But indications are he will reject any fixed agreement with Ottawa and will fight for full deductibility of the Quebec provincial income tax from federal levies in that province.

While the provinces approach the conference with what appears to be many conflicting views on tax arrangements, there appears to be a more common approach on national health insurance.

Most of the premiers interviewed said they would press for some national scheme.

TITO AILING

BELGRADE. (AP)—Yugoslav President Tito is suffering from rheumatism and has left Belgrade for treatment on his Adriatic island retreat of Brioni.

Tanjung news agency reported Saturday. Tanjung said Tito will continue his duties as president but that the number of visitors will be limited.

N. Y. STOCKS

NEW YORK. (AP)—Is the great American bull market ... at an end?

That was the top question in Wall street last week following the extraordinary break in prices Monday on news of President Eisenhower's heart attack.

The Monday break was an extraordinary thing. A week before, the market stood at a record high after a two year boom of unprecedented size. Then came news of the president's illness. There was enough of a before the stock market opened Monday for members to brace themselves for the selling they expected.

They got it in vast quantities. Business amounted to 7,720,000 shares, greatest in 22 years.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks closed the week at \$173.30, a net loss of \$8.20. The average now is back to the levels of six weeks ago.

The five most active issues on the New York stock exchange were U. S. Steel off 4% at 97 1/4, Chrysler off 1% at 97 1/4, General Motors off 1% at 142 1/4.
