the United States). "Patriotism," Edith Cavell is reported to have said, "is not enough." It may be enough for the youth of Germany and Italy (and now Bolivia), but it is not enough for the Scout movement, which is truly international in its composition and outlook.

Just how international has been shown by the great Jamborees in England, Holland and Switzerland, where Scouts from China, Texas, India and France found a common meeting ground. Scouts from Germany and Italy used to attend these Jamborees in the pre-Hitler days. In the pre-Hitler days, too, it was common for English Scouts to go touring in Germany, where they were royally welcomed. But no more.

Under the watchful eye of Hitler and Mussolini, young children march, salute, use toy guns, sport daggers and gas masks. They learn to hate other nations. That is not, can never be, the way of Scouting.

It is not, you will note, that Scouting has died in these countries; the nature of the movement is to grow vigorously. It has been abolished by official decree. Because something was wrong about the movement? Or because something was wrong about the country which abolished it? The answer stands out with unmistakable clarity.

Scout News and Notices

As in previous years, Toronto Boy Scouts acted as ushers on the grandstand at the Canadian National Exhibition, rounded up lost children, and rendered many other forms of service.

The friendly reception given by the Scouts of London, Ont., to a troop of American Scouts, from Texaco at the time of the King's visit is credited by The London Free Press with bringing a number of Texas tourists into Western Ontario.

As annually for some years, the Proclamation concerning National Fire Prevention Week published in The Canada Gazette includes a section calling upon Scout leaders to give instructions to their boys in the best means of co-operating with municipal fire departments.

Throughout the period of the visit of Their Majesties to Canada this summer Scouts of the 19th Hamilton, Ont., Troop each morning raised the Union Jack on the flagpole in Gore Park in the centre of the city. A bugle note drew the attention of passing citizens to the ceremony, and many halted and stood at attention or removed their hats.

"Eagle Chief" is the new name of Sir Percy Everett, Deputy Commissioner of Imperial Headquarters of the Boy Scouts Association, now touring Canada. The name, and membership in the western branch of the Cree tribe of Indians, was dramatically conferred upon the Scout Commissioner by Chief Sampson, in full ceremonial dress, at a Scout Jamboree at Camp Woods on Sylvan Lake, near Edmonton. Forming a background for the campfire ceremony were representatives of the tribe and a large number of Scouts dressed as young Indian braves. The name Eagle Chief presumably was suggested by the fact that Sir Percy soared down to the lake from the skies in a plane, and left by the same eagle-like means. The honorary chief was presented with a ceremonial headdress of feathers and a beautifully beaded pouch.

Boy Scouts of Cobalt, Ont., largely make up the Junior Safety Patrol which goes on traffic duty each day under Chief of Police Platoon to protect children going to and from school. The patrol wear white crossbelts supplied by the Kiwanis Club.

The Boy Scout movement upholds law and order; the development of character; the development of the way of thought implied in such words as fairness, democracy and Christianity.

Sugar Chaos Is Believed Subsiding

OTTAWA, Sept. 13.—(CP)—The war-time Prices and Trade Board said in a statement tonight that "while complaints are still coming in from various localities, it is evident that the 'ouvers' panic, which has created chaotic conditions in connection with the supply of sugar, is now subsiding." The Board said that deliveries by Canadian refiners to all classes of customers in Canada during the six weeks ending yesterday were more than 192,000,000 pounds, compared with less than 150,000,000 pounds during the same period in 1937. "This increase of almost 30 per cent indicates that the refining industry as a whole is carrying out its undertaking to the board to make deliveries to the trade up to 25 per cent in excess of the three year average for this period," the statement said. "Complaints to the board that wholesalers and jobbers in some areas are accumulating abnormal stocks are being investigated and prompt measures will be taken should any such abuses be revealed."

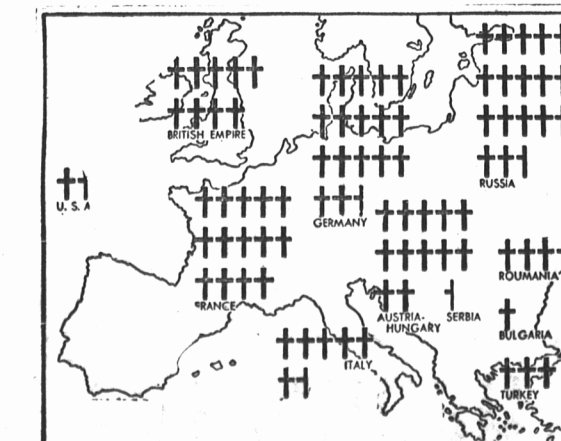

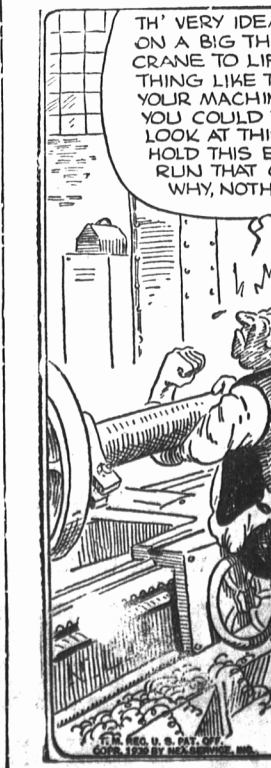
Island Temperance Campaigns Continue

Defining alcoholism as "that poisoning of body, germ plasma, mind, conduct, and society, produced by the consumption of alcoholic beverages," Mr. Spence has been forcefully pointing out that added facilities to secure liquor means increased consumption; that all laws embody a mandate or prohibition; that wet forces have paid immense sums to overthrow Prohibition in Canada; that Government sale does not control the sellings of alcoholic beverages;

Lobster Marketing Conference Called

AUGUSTA, Me., Sept. 13.—(AP)—Governor Lewis O. Barrows today confidently expected his proposed lobster marketing conference between the seven American producing states and the Canadian Provinces would result in "friendly agreements" to control the supply at certain seasons and prevent "market gluts and price-killing competition." Barrows said Maine and several other states were ready to confer

"any time" with Canadian officials in an effort to work out a plan for the states and provinces to "make the most of their virtual monopoly of the lobster supply." "It seems unfortunate and unnecessary," said Barrows, "that, despite this monopoly of such a popular delicacy, the fishermen of both countries find it so difficult to make a living." Barrows was advised by R. J. MacSween of the Nova Scotia agricultural department that MacSween believed the present method of lobster marketing was "very unsatisfactory." Barrows said he was glad to cooperate with you in any effort calculated to remedy the situation. (No word of the conference has been received officially here. The Guardian is informed. The fisherman receives an average of 10c a lb. for live lobsters which sell when shipped, at 20-30c but the spread in the price between fishermen and consumer is not as great as would be indicated at first glance when the cost of processing, shipping, shrinking, and refrigeration, is taken into account.)
