

Dr. Ira J. Yeo Dies In Hospital

A former mayor and resident of Charlottetown, Dr. Ira J. Yeo died yesterday in the Prince Edward Island Hospital following a prolonged illness. He was in his 80th year.

Dr. Yeo was vice-principal of West Kent School in the early 1900's prior to his entering McGill University where he graduated from the faculty of medicine in 1908.

He practised in Charlottetown for 51 years until his retirement in 1959. He was medical attendant at the Charlottetown Infirmary for 16 years prior to his retirement.

He was a member of the City Council from 1918 until 1930. He served as councillor for Ward Four from 1918 until 1928 and was mayor of the city from 1928 to 1930. As a councillor he was chairman of the police, streets, public property and tender committees.

He was chairman of the Charlottetown School Board for some 12 years.

He is a past chairman of the board of directors of the Prince Edward Island Hospital and a former chief of staff at the P.E.I. Hospital.

Dr. Yeo was one of the sponsors of the Charlottetown Forum and he was president of the company which operated the Forum for 35 years.

He was also president of the Abegweit Amateur Athletic As-

sociation and played a major part in bringing Big Four hockey to the Province.

ESTABLISHED HOSPITAL

When Dr. Yeo returned to Charlottetown from medical school he helped organize the Ninth Field Ambulance, which he later commanded at Valcartier, Que., in the early days of World War One. While at Valcartier the Charlottetown unit established a field hospital for the 1st Canadian Contingent which veterans claim was the first of its kind in Canada.

Dr. Yeo took an active part in behind-the-scenes political activities. For some years he was president of the 5th Queens Liberal Association.

For a number of years Dr. Yeo was the head of the choir at the First Baptist Church, Charlottetown.

Dr. Yeo was pre-deceased by his wife, the former H. Louise Horne, in August, 1959. He is survived by three sisters; Alma and Helen of 20 Waltham Drive, city and Edna, Mrs. W. P. McVie of Montreal and one brother Dr. Harold Yeo of 193 Prince Street, city.

The remains are resting at the MacLean Funeral Home until Friday afternoon from where they will be transferred to the First Baptist Church for services at two p. m.

Directors And Curators Will Meet Here Friday

Art directors and curators of the major galleries and university art centres of the Atlantic Provinces will gather in Charlottetown's Confederation Centre Friday for a one-day annual meeting.

The group was established as a professional body only last year under the auspices of the fine arts department of Mount Allison University at the instigation of Professor Lauren P. Harris. It meets in a different province each year.

The delegates will be entertained at luncheon by the City of Charlottetown and at dinner by the Prince Edward Island government.

Business sessions will cover a wide range of subjects including the transportation and insurance of valuable works of art, an exhibition program for 1966-67, and a proposed special exhibition of works by Atlantic area artists to tour Western Canada in the fall of 1966.

Represented at the conference will be the Beaverbrook Gallery in Fredericton, the University of New Brunswick, the Provincial Museum of New Brunswick, Mount Allison University, the Nova Scotia College of Art, Memorial University of St. John's, Newfoundland,

Acadia University, St. Dunstan's University and the host gallery at Confederation Centre.

Delegates will take time out from business sessions to view the '15 Canadian Artists' exhibition currently hanging in Confederation Gallery. They will also attend a Friday night lecture by Dr. Nathan Stolow, UNMASKED FRAUD.

ional Gallery in Ottawa, will tell a public audience about methods used in analysing and restoring paintings, methods which were used in the unmasking of North America's greatest art fraud. The sensational case was climaxed by a trial in Toronto last year.

The case involved two Toronto dealers, Leslie W. Lewis and Neil Sharkey, both of whom received prison sentences for attempting to peddle more than a hundred fake paintings attributed to Tom Thomson, A. Y. Jackson and others of the Group of Seven as well as works supposedly by Emily Carr, Cornelius Krieghoff, David Milne and others.

In actual fact the paintings had been done by unknown artists as copies of the originals. Without their knowledge, the copies had been sold at public auction by the two crooked dealers after fake signatures had been attached and an artificial aging process had given the copies an authentic look.

As a result of the evidence compiled by Dr. Stolow, the two dealers pleaded guilty and were sentenced to prison terms.

Dr. Stolow's lecture Friday will touch on the celebrated case, but primarily will deal with the less sensational uses to which scientific analysis is put in modern art galleries.
