ANNOUNCES CONTEST

With a wreath of poppies which symbolizes Remembrance Day, Harold Harkness, chairman of a committee of the Summerside branch of the Canadian Legion, yesterday announced the details of an essay contest for three age groups of school students in Summerside and several surrounding districts.

The topic of the essay is "Why I Wear A Poppy", and Mr. Harkness said the essay is being sponsored by the Summerside branch of the Legion in order to foster a spirit of remembrance among the younger people of the community.

He said a prize of \$15 will be awarded to the writer of the best essay in each of three age groups, inclusive from grades 6

to 8, 9 and 10, 11 and 12, and is open to schools in Summerside, St. Eleanors, Linkletter, Sherbrooke, and Travellers Rest.

Each school is entitled to submit three essays in each group with the teachers selecting the essays that will be submitted. The contest will close on October 24th, with the entries being in possession of the Summerside Legion secretary manager, James T. Hogan, by that date;

The winners in each group will go the additional honor of reading his or her essay at the Summerside High School assembly period in the civic auditorium on Thursday, November 7th, four days previous to the observance of Remembrance Day.

The rally theme is "focus on essentials," a topic just as vital today as it was in July, 1932, when sixty-five young people met in Sackville to form the first Maritime executive and rally.

Program highlights include registration and billeting on Saturday afternoon, the anniversary banquet, four theme addresses, religious drama, Bible study, business session, election and installation of new officers, commission meetings, divine worship, etc.

'TRAIL OF THE LONESOME PINE'
