'Make Room For Him' Rotarians Are Urged

"If we make room for Him at this Christmas, we enter into that new life which was brought to light by His wondrous birth," said Rev. T. H. B. Somers in delivering his annual Christmas message to Rotary at the weekly luncheon meeting at the Charlottetown Hotel yesterday.

"By doing this the divine influence of this blessed season will remain with us, not as a pious memory, but as a vital inspiration," Mr. Somers said.

"There is so much that we must leave behind us, dead and buried, as from the manger we go forth to raise and tumult of life again. We all have the rage of soiled garments, torn and bespattered by the world, to leave behind us as we return from Bethlehem. There are those false judgments and envies and personal dislikes and animosities which so much embitter life and tend to leave behind us, and that tendency to become hard and selfish, to which so many of us fall victim as we go on our way."

"Nineteen hundred years ago the people of a little hill-town called Bethlehem settled for a matter of persons, the choicest of the world which had suddenly invaded their quiet streets. They made their choice and received their reward. But a group of shepherds and a little band of wise-men were of a different mind. They elected to seek out a lowly stable, and to make obscurity before a child, a Mother, a Family. And their reward? They found wonder and worship and a blessing which would shine in their hearts for ever. You see they had chosen Christmas."

"Today, you and I can choose our Christmas just as surely as those ancients. Let us do so wisely.

A FAMILY CHRISTMAS
 "Let us choose a family Christmas, inspired by the Holy Family, let us make a vow that this Christmas we will reaffirm the glory of the Christian family. Let us rekindle the heart-fire of our affection for each other, and for the stranger within our gates. Let each father be a Joseph—strong, devoted, wise. Let each mother be a Mary—wise, pure, loving. Let each child be a Holy Child nurtured and trained to bring hope to our broken and bewildered world. Yes, let us choose a family Christmas this year.

"Then, let us choose a joyful Christmas. Yes, even joy is a matter of choice. To be sure, we live in a sad time, in an age buffeted by a succession of sorrows. And yet, at the heart of life, God calls us to rejoice and to be exceeding glad. How can He make such a demand? He can do so, because He has not let us amid our sins and sorrows. At this festive season, He recalls to us how He sent His Son to earth to be a Saviour and a King. Confronting the blessed miracle of the Incarnation, and all the hope it holds for us and for our world, let us choose a joyful Christmas this year.

A HOLY CHRISTMAS
 "Finally, let us choose the holy Christmas. Remembering the God of Christmas, His mighty acts and miracles, we must needs offer the homage of our worship.

In the days to come, let us seek out the services of our church. Let Christmas music soothe our hearts. Let the Christmas Mass inspire our minds. Let the Christmas blessing make all our days truly blessed.

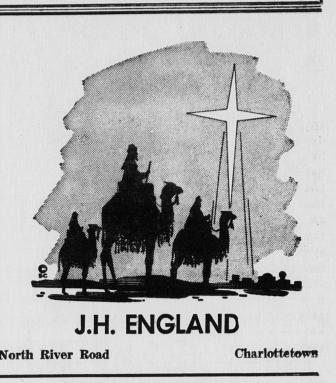
