

Yankees Increase Series Lead On Byrne's 5-Hitter

NEW YORK (AP) — Tommy Byrne, 35-year-old converted wild-man who was discarded by four American League teams, baffled Brooklyn with five hits Thursday as New York Yankees made it two straight over the Dodgers, 4-2, and took a commanding world series lead.

Byrne, often referred to as "that good hitting pitcher," ground ball into the Dodgers' wounds by driving home the two winning runs with a line single past Billy Loes in the fourth inning.

The gabby lefthander, who likes to talk to the opposing hitters as he works, was helped by three Yankee double plays as he rode home free on a four-run fourth inning rally that routed Loes.

There may still be hope in Flatbush for the futility Brooks but the record books carry the cold facts that only one team in all series history ever has bounced back to win after losing the first two. That team was the 1921 New York Giants and they had a best-of-nine series in which to recover and top the Yankees' first pennant winners.

In contrast to Wednesday's booming opener when five home runs sailed through the muggy air, the Yankees managed to win this one on eight singles, five of them bunched in the fourth inning when they got all four runs after two were out.

Byrne was tremendous, walking five and striking out six as he nonchalantly mixed his fast ball and "nickel slider" to hamstring the Brooks.

It was after a fine Dodger double play that the Yankees began to rattle and roar in the fourth against Loes, the 25-year-old righty.

Trailing 1-0 as they came to bat in the fourth, the Yankees greeted Loes with a single by Gil McDougald but he and Irv Noren quickly were chopped down when Gil Hodges came up with Noren's sharp grounder near the bag, and then in the fifth and threw to Wee Reese who made the tag to complete a double play.

YANKS TAKE LEAD

Then it happened, Yogi Berra dropped a single into short left center and Joe Collins walked on four pitches. Elston Howard hit

a single to left, scoring Berra as Jackie Robinson slowed down Junior Gilliam's throw to the plate, attempting to make a cutoff.

As Berra scored the tying run there was great debate in the stands as to whether Gilliam's peg would have cut down the runner if Robinson hadn't interfered.

The crowd of 64,707 still was buzzing when Billy Martin smashed an even shorter single to left and Gilliam made no throw at all. Collins scoring from second to give the Yanks a lead they never yielded.

Manager Walter Alston of the Dodgers came out to converse with Loes at this critical point but decided to stick with his 10-game

winner. It turned out to be a mistake.

LOADED SACKS

Casey Stengel, the Yankee manager, called for Eddie Robinson, a lefthanded hitting first baseman, to bat for Phil Rizzuto. Loes' first pitch to Robinson plunked him in the middle of the back and the bases were full.

Byrne, sometimes used as a pinch hitter, looked at an inside pitch, then tagged the next on a line into center field. Both Howard and Martin romped home.

It mattered not that Alston then replaced Loes with rookie Don Bessent who made Bob Cerv ground out on the first pitch. Cerv runs were in and that was the ball game.

Stengel said he will use Bob Turley (17-13), his fast-balling righthander, on today's third game at Ebbets Field.

Alston will go with a lefthander, Johnny Podres (10-10) instead of Carl Erskine (11-8) who has had arm trouble.

"If they pitch a righthander and Stengel says he will I may use Sandy Amoros in left and move Gilliam to second to get some more lefthanders in the lineup," said Alston.

Tommy Byrne Lulls Brooks With "Psyche" And Lies

NEW YORK (AP)—Old Tommy Byrne, who two years ago thought his baseball days might be ended, said today he used a little bit of "psyche" and a little bit of lying to lull Brooklyn's big bats into impotency for the Yankees' 4-2 second game victory in the world series.

"I told Duke Snider in the eighth inning I was going to throw him a fast ball," Byrne said. "But I gave him a slider instead."

The strikeout of Snider was one of three big strikeouts for the Yankee veteran which ended Brooklyn threats. He whiffed Pee Wee Reese with a man on base in the fifth, fooled Snider in the eighth and then made Gil Hodges bite at a slider in the ninth to end the game.

"All three strikeouts were with sliders," said Byrne. "I threw a few slow curves and tossed in a fast ball here and there."

Walt Alston Plans Lineup Change If Turley Starts

NEW YORK (AP) — Manager Walter Alston, glum and quiet, today planned on a possible shakeup of the Brooklyn Dodgers' lineup when the world series moves to Ebbets Field today.

"If the Yankees pitch a right hander, I may use Amoros and shift Gilliam to second to get as many left hand hitters into the order as possible," said Alston.

"It's not that Zimmerman didn't do all right. I just want another left handed hitter in there."

Manager Casey Stengel of the Yankees plans to start Bob Tur-

ley, a right hander. Junior Gilliam played left field in the first two series games but he is a good infielder, too. Don Zimmer got one hit today, but made two errors, although neither miscue proved harmful.

DODGERS IN HOPE

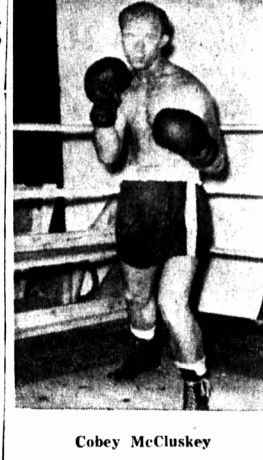
Today's 4-2 Yankee victory put the Dodgers in a deep, deep hole but the team wasn't downcast. They were more puzzled than anything else, and the object of their puzzlement was Tommy Byrne, the aged Yankee left hander who man- aged them.

"I wish somebody could tell me what Byrne had," said Alston, and then answered the question by adding "he's got an assortment of breaking stuff and an occasional fast ball."

Alston was asked what was the matter with his pitcher, Billy Loes, in the big Yankee fourth inning.

"He didn't lose his stuff, I know that," said Alston. "Camp said he didn't either. Yogi didn't hit his ball good. Martin's wasn't a screamer. The only real good hit was Byrne's. I'm certainly not going to answer the question whether I left him in there too long."

NEW YORK (AP)—This is becoming to look like 1953 all over again. The Yanks won the first two games in the Yankee Stadium then, and went on to win the series in six games.

While watching batting practice Brook manager Walt Alston mused almost to himself:

"I've fought all year to get here and if we blow it, we'll be just bums. This means a lot to me."

Alston probably was thinking that he'd quiet his most severe critics if he became the first manager to bring Brooklyn a world championship.

Still, he left himself open to second guessing when he stuck with Loes in the big fourth. Billy already had allowed four hits and when Alston came out of the dugout to talk to him.

The plot line in and Billy promptly hit the next batter, pinch-hitter Eddie Robinson, then was tapped for a single by Byrne. That was all, but by then it was too late.

Rumors making the rounds in the press room, ex-Giant manager Leo Durocher will be back in baseball before the start of next season and Dixie Walker, the old Brooklyn idol, will get the Pittsburgh managership.

MONTREAL (CP) — If your team had a yard to go and it was un troussienne essai would you try un fauille by le quart-arriere or un jeu facultatif or maybe even un jeu de surprise from une formation de botte?

But suppose le bloqueur droit adversaire was hors-jeu would you sock him in the snoot?

Before you pop your helmet we might as well tell you this isn't double talk at all, as anyone among Montreal Alouettes' French-Canadian supporters will tell you.

WELL THOUGHT OUT

This French terminology for football wasn't arrived at haphazardly. Newspaper men, broadcasters and telecasters and the bilingual fellows who describe the games over the public-address system got together. With the fast-growing interest in football among French-Canadian sports fans—and there are none more enthusiastic—ground decision on French terminology was necessary.

Some of the boys had been manufacturing phrases that others considered a bit dizzy. Privately, some of them think a few of the consensus expressions are still dizzy.

Anyway, let's get back into the game. Maybe that third-down problem facing you could have been solved by a quarterback sneak or an optional play, or did you try that sleeper play from punt or field goal?

Also, there was no need for you to smack the other team's right tackle in the puss. You really benefitted. The guy was offside.

All right, then, let's go into a scuse. Yop, that's a huddle.

But if we take too long in le caucus it'll cost us une perte d'un essai.

Catch on?

Let's see, now. Sam Etcheverry might try un passe-avant to Joey Pal, our voltigeur who happens also, strangely enough, to be our flying wing. Maybe we should let demi-arriere Pat Abbruzzo get away fast from his halfback position, with Sam running out of the formation T-espase.

NO ROUGHING PLEASE

But don't let's get a punition for rudesse—roughness—and let's have no echappes by butter-fingered ball carriers.

You're getting the signals down fine now but maybe you should know that champ-arriere means backfield and a ballon mort is a dead ball. Watch out for assaut du cote, which is clipping a guy from the side, and assaut par derriere, clipping from behind.

Ends are ailiers or exterieurs, guards are gardes and centres are just centres.

A punt is a botte and the kick-off is a botte initial. Line backers are the defensive secondaire and horslimites means out of bounds. Jeu au sol is a running play and lancer is a pitch-out. You can kick a placement in either French or English. Mi-temps is halftime and plaquer means to tackle. Remise duballon is a hand-off and rebucher means to trip.

The referee is arbitre-en-chef; the umpire is just a plain ordinary arbitre. The head linesman is juge des lignes and the field judge is juge de jeu.

All straight now? Fine. Let's march down the field to a touche and if you don't know what that is you're fired from the team.
