October finished at \$1.07 3-4. December \$1.05 3-4 to 7-8 and May \$1.07 7-8 to 1.08 a bushel. Export business estimated at 1,000,000 bushels, good foreign buying influenced the advance. Trade showed moderately active. Chicago closed 1 3-4 to 3 3-8 cents higher. Influenced by bullish private estimates on the Canadian wheat crop, Liverpool closed 2 to 1 5-8 higher. Excellent enquiry was found in cash wheat, but offerings proved scarce. Coarse grains showed good buying in rye credited to outside houses, with profit taking well absorbed. 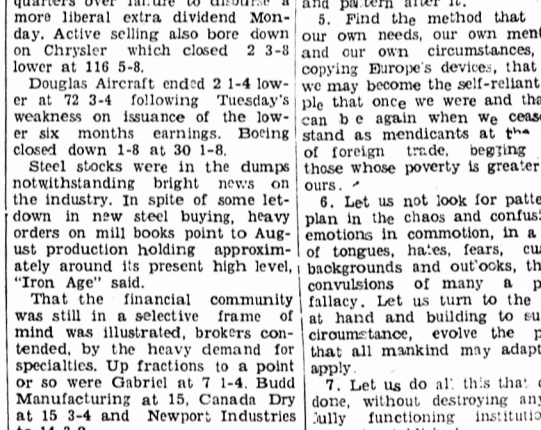
Stocks Follow Mixed Trend In New York

By Guardian's Special Wire) NEW YORK, Aug. 5—Buffeted by selling in the motors and aircrafts the stock market firmed somewhat in late trading but closed irregularly lower. Brokers said they were caught between cross currents of favorable trade and industrial news and caution inspired by continued drought and foreign clouds. Near the finish there was a half-hearted rally which failed to get very far. In terms of the Associated Press averages of 60 shares the market closed 1/2 lower at 67.8. Transactions totalled 1,284,700 shares against 1,049,230 on Tuesday.
