David Pratt corroborated evidence given by his father and MacDonald.

year and approximately 12 1-2 per cent for those ranging from \$1,800 to \$3,000. From there upwards, the rate of increase will decline gradually to about four per cent at the \$7,500 bracket.

Those earning more than \$7,500 a year won't get an increase. Here are some examples of the civil service increases:

At \$1,200 a year, the increase is \$120; at \$1,500, \$168; at \$1,800, \$228; at \$2,100, \$252; at \$2,400, \$300; at \$2,700, \$324; at \$3,000, \$360; at \$3,300, \$384; at \$3,600, \$408; at \$3,900, \$432; at \$4,200, \$456; at \$4,500, \$480; at \$4,800, \$504; at \$5,100, \$528; at \$5,400, \$552; at \$5,700, \$576; at \$6,000, \$600; at \$6,300, \$624; at \$6,600, \$648; at \$6,900, \$672; at \$7,200, \$696; at \$7,500, \$720.

railway yard and went down and found four of Mr. Pratt's calves. He drove them home and then informed Mr. Pratt and his son, who were eating breakfast.

In company with the two Pratt men he then went to the accused station where he saw the accused with three trucks. The witness quoted Chester C. Pratt as asking the accused if they had seen any of his cattle there and they said no but that some of theirs had got out.

The witness and the two Pratt men then opened the door of a stock car on a siding and took out five calves which Chester C. Pratt identified as his. They left behind one calf which Mr. Pratt senior said looked alike but which he could not identify positively.

Recognized Calf

Chester C. Pratt was the next witness. He told of going to the station and recognizing one of his animals—a blue and white calf—through the open slats of a stock car. He told of removing the animal and four others. The car was loaded and ready for shipment and a train was due shortly to pick it up. Later he called the police at Souris.

The witness said his calves had peculiar markings from the others in the car. Three of his were black and white, one a red Shorthorn and the other blue and white. He thought there were about 40 calves in the car.

He said he valued his calves at approximately \$50. He never knew cattle to escape from the railway pens before and his particular bunch of calves had never left home before.
