TUBERCULOSIS AT THE EXPERIMENTAL FARM.

Sir Wilfrid and Sir Louis to Go to Washington.

OTTAWA, Oct. 28.—The date of the meeting of Parliament has not yet been fixed, but the Government is talking over the programme for the next session. An insolvency bill will likely be among the new measures introduced. If at all possible Parliament will meet about the middle of January, certainly no later than the first of February.

The outbreak of tuberculosis at the Experimental Farm is a serious one.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier will accompany Sir Louis Davies to Washington. His visit implies something more than Behring Sea matters.

The suit of John H. Balderston, late secretary of the Railway Department, for additional superannuation, was decided against him in the Exchequer Court.

WOMAN BURNED TO DEATH.

ST. HYACINTHE, Oct. 28.—Mrs. Belair, aged 60 years, was smoking in her house at St. Joseph's, across the river from here. Her clothing ignited and she was burned to death.

LATEST NEWS BY WIRE AND MAIL.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 26.—The bark Lydia, the first of the whaling fleet to arrive, reached here yesterday. Only three whales, yielding 45,000 pounds of bone and 300 barrels of oil, which reported as the season's catch. The bark was out eight months and two days. On September 20 she passed out of Okhotsk Sea by the way of Dina Straits. A succession of heavy gales were encountered on the entire passage, with constant heavy rains. On September 6th, the bark Aurora Hicks was sighted. She also had caught only three whales. About the time the bark started home the crew stated that many whales were sighted in the northeast Gulf, but, feared shipwreck, Captain Jenks decided to return to this port.

LONDON, Oct. 26.—Mr. Fielding in the course of a speech at a banquet this evening, dwelt on the neighborly feeling that the people of Canada wished to maintain with the United States. He said: "Colonel Hay and I have been sitting side by side this evening, and have eaten our fish in harmony, quite without reference to the question whether they were caught within the three mile limit. I hope this fact may be taken as a happy augury of the relations between the Dominion and the United States."

CONSTANTINOPLE, Oct. 26.—The Turkish government has sent a circular to its representatives abroad protesting against the trial tomorrow of a number of Mussulmans by the judicial commission of the Island of Crete and demanding that the accused be sent to Rhodes for trial. The Porte also demands that 10,000 rifles which were seized on board a vessel from the Piræus, the port of Athens by the international authorities of Crete shall be handed over to the Ottoman government.

NEW YORK, Oct. 26.—It is safe to say betting men regard Tammany's chances as best in the New York election. But, despite feeling the odds on Van Wyck against the field has been lowered, and five to four seems best procurable. Hugh C. Grant says for Tammany: "Van Wyck will be elected." Secretary Clark, of Citizen's league, claims for Low one hundred and ninety thousand. Chairman Clegg, of the Tracy forces, gives his figures as sixty thousand. Chairman Abbott, of Jefferson democracy, says George will surely be elected.

HAVANA, Oct. 26.—The failure of the autonomist policy of the new Spanish cabinet seems more and more apparent every day. Dissensions are known to exist among the autonomist leaders, and the conservatives have pronounced themselves strongly opposed to the granting of an autonomist form of government to Cuba, and have, so to say, washed their hands of the consequences which may follow if the government at Madrid persists in carrying out the plans of Premier Sagasta.

MONTREAL, Oct. 26.—Hon. George E. Foster, ex-Finance Minister, arrived here today. In an interview he said he was surprised at the success of the recent loan, as Canada's credit amply justified it. He had thought 94 would have been obtained, but there is always a risk in reducing the rate of interest and there were many prophets of evil when he made his last loan at 3 per cent. Premier Laurier, he said, had got into internal party difficulties from which even an abler man would find it hard to extricate himself.

TORONTO, Oct. 26.—At a meeting of the executive of the World's W. C. T. U., today the following officers were unanimously re-elected:

Assistant Secretary—Miss Anna Godon, Evanston, Ill.

The superintendents were all re-elected including Mrs. Butler, England, who wrote a fierce letter against Lady Henry Somerset.

DUBLIN, Oct. 26.—John Daly is no longer eligible for election to the mayoralty of Limerick, the revision court having struck his name off the list of burgesses for the current year on the ground that he has not occupied a residence at Limerick for a year prior to August 3.

MADRID, Oct. 25.—It is reported here that the Spanish Government has cabled to General Weyler, the retiring captain general of Cuba, instructing him to await the arrival of his successor, Marshal Blanco, before embarking on his return to Spain.

LONDON, Oct. 26.—Ambassador Hay, Hon. Mr. Fielding, and Gilbert Parker, the novelist, were guests at a banquet of prominent literary and newspaper people given this evening. Mr. Fielding and Mr. Parker made speeches.
