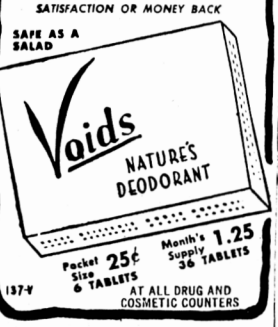


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BURGESS BEDTIME STORIES

Contract Bridge

APPRAISING ONE'S OPPONENT

Declarer's correct play in the following situation depends entirely on his appraisal of his right-hand opponent.

North dealer.
 Both sides vulnerable.

♠ 9 8 5
 ♥ K 10 9 6
 ♦ Q J 8 4
 ♣ A Q

♠ A 7 4
 ♥ 8 3
 ♦ K 10
 ♣ 9 7 6 5 3 2

The bidding:
 North East South West
 Pass Pass 1♥ Pass
 3♥ Pass 4♥ Pass
 Pass Pass

The unfortunate duplication of length in spades in the North and South hands allowed the defender to pick off the first three tricks in spades, and, after West exited with a club, South was at

the mercy of (a) a highly favorable position of the missing diamond honors, and (b) his own guessing ability. Needless to say, South drew the opposing trumps after winning with the club ace, but he could not long defer his attack in the diamond suit, and when he led the diamond queen from dummy and East covered, South had a problem!

That problem, reduced to its simplest terms, was: How good a player was East? A good player, sitting in the East seat and holding the K-X-X of diamonds, would not dream of covering the first honor led from dummy — he would wait to cover the jack. By thus waiting, this player would protect his partner's
