Hundreds Attend Air Force Day Ceremonies At S'side Air Station

With fine weather prevailing, hundreds of people accepted the invitation of the R.C.A.F. to visit the Summerside station on Saturday, Air Force Day. The highlight of the program was the wings parade and the graduating ceremony for eleven student navigators, including one Islander, Flight Cadet R.L. MacLaughlin of Stanhope, P.E.I.

Air Vice Marshall F.R. Miller, C.B.E., Ottawa, air member for operations and training presented the wings and took the salute for the march past. The commanding officer of the station, Wing Commander R.F. Gross commanded the parade.

The march past was conducted with smartness and precision and the squadron of 12 Dakota aircraft arrived over the saluting stand for the fly past at the general salute right on the proper moment. The band of the P.E.I. Regiment from Charlottetown was in attendance.

In introducing A/V/M Miller to those assembled W/C Gross referred to him as a former commanding officer of Summerside station in 1942. A/V/M Miller expressed his pleasure at being back to Summerside and participating in the ceremony. He said that the Summerside station is very fortunate in that it has the support and confidence of the community which is an asset to the school and the R.C.A.F.

He told the graduates that he felt sure they would always have a warm spot in their hearts for Summerside. He wished them God speed as they take their place with fellow airmen across Canada.

At the conclusion of the parade he complimented the commanding officer on its excellence.

Inspect Aircraft After the parade the crowd were able to see various types of aircraft in flight and on the ground. Perhaps the most interest was taken in a squadron of Vampire jet aircraft from Chatham station which swept overhead at a speed of over 500 miles an hour.

One of them later landed for inspection and a large crowd congregated about it. The squadron of Dakotas flew over in a number of formations, their silver bodies making a striking picture against the blue sky. A Lancaster made a number of low altitude bombing runs over the station.

During the latter part of the afternoon two Harvards put on a display of aerobatics. Most of the people took advantage of the opportunity to inspect the aircraft, especially the Lancasters and Dakotas. Other displays of training equipment were also there for the inspection of the public. In the evening a dance was held in the station community center.

At a short press conference in the morning A/V/M Miller referred to the fact that while he was commanding officer at Summerside Mr. R.E. Ellis, then Squadron Leader Ellis, was his chief administrative officer and "his main stay." Asked about reports that the air armament school at Trenton might be moved to Summerside he said that this is a possibility but no decision has been made yet.

With A/V/M Miller was a member of his staff, Lieut. Col. W. Turner of the United States Air Force. A/V/M Miller said that Col. Turner's presence on his staff is a good example of the team work that exists between the U.S. and Canadian forces. Canadian officers are holding similar positions in the United States.
