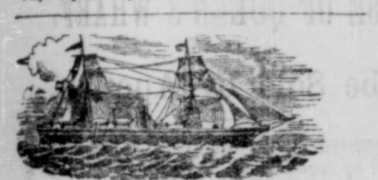

The Signal was Foggy.

HOW THIEVES PLAN TO ROB A PENNSYLVANIA TOWN.

A special to the New York World from Shenandoah, Pa., says: "In consequence of the fear that the large reservoir in the mountain immediately above the town might burst, owing to the heavy rains, sentinels were posted near the dam last Friday night with instructions to fire a cannon as a warning signal in the event of a break. It was arranged that at the sound of the cannon the people of the town must run for their lives, as the bursting of the reservoir meant the inundation of the valley. About midnight the roar of a cannon in the mountain rolled through the valley. All honest folks that heard it fled from their homes, thinking that the signal that the breastworks had given away. Hundreds of houses and stores were deserted, as the people thought only of saving their lives. The cannon that had been fired was not the one manned by the sentinels at the dam. It was a gun fired by a gang of thieves, who gave the false signal in order to gain an opportunity to pillage the deserted houses and stores. The robbers plundered about twenty houses and stores and made an attempt to get into the Citizens' Bank. While the three were drilling a hole in the door of the bank, the watchman, who had not heard the false warning, suddenly appeared and opened fire on the thieves. A number of shots were exchanged, which had the effect of attracting to the scene of the shooting several hundred persons who helped to drive off the robbers. It was then seen that no fire was in sight, and the people, returning, found they were robbed."

The Hatched Chinese.

CANADIAN PACIFIC OFFICIALS HAVE OVER A THOUSAND AT VANCOUVER.

A recent Vancouver despatch says: The Canadian Pacific steamer, and according to hands over a thousand Chinese on their way home must either get into the United States or be returned to China by the Company's steamer. The Danube left Victoria on board, but owing to the severe examination only 180 passed. The steamer is now in trouble with the American customs officials, who claim that she is liable to a fine of \$10,000. Chinese were dumped into the ship's hold without bunk, and it is claimed that the vessel was only intended to carry 300 Chinese. A fine of \$50 each can be imposed for carrying over the number, \$5 each because no chairs or tables were provided, \$500 because there were no ventilators, and \$250 because no surgeon was carried. The steamer belongs to the Canadian Pacific Navigation Company, who claim the law does not apply to Canadian vessels.

Last evening the brigantine Tacoma left here for Portland, Oregon, with 500 Chinese men on board. The company, however, took precaution to have berths built between decks and other conveniences. The vessel looked like a slave ship with her curious cargo. This is the largest batch of Chinese yet brought over, and they all claim to be merchants. It is thought a number will be refused admittance. The company has secured the bulk of the trade. It is thought that rival American companies are compelling the American officials to stick to the letter of the law, as the late \$50 a head the company makes a big profit.
