Drop Shown In Unemployment In Kings and Queens

For the first time since January, the number of people drawing Unemployment Insurance benefit in Kings and Queens County, dropped below the two thousand mark during the past week.

The Charlottetown Office of the National Employment Service, reported yesterday, that 1958 people were still drawing weekly cheques. Of this number, 1238 are living in the rural sections of Kings and Queens county, and the remaining 720 are citizens of Charlottetown, the Royalty, and surrounding districts.

One week ago, the grand total for country and city was 2141. So that the claim total has dropped almost 200 in one week. There was a reduction in the number of the city people drawing claims from 804 to 720—a difference of 84, and the rural total dropped from 1337 to 1238—a difference of 99.

The greater proportion of the decrease in the number of people drawing claims, went back into employment, but some disappeared from the list of claimants because they no longer had further benefits due them.

Mild Upsurge

There has been a mild upsurge in employment, although it cannot be said there is any indication of a general return to work as yet. The weather continues to hamper construction work, and no residential building can be expected until more favourable working conditions arrive. Work on the T. Eaton building is rapidly approaching the point where many more men will be engaged. This job did absorb fifteen more men during the week.

The foundation work is well underway, and once it is completed, the working staff will be greatly increased. Work on the new High School is progressing well, and a large number of men are steadily employed on that job.

At all the fishing centres in Kings and Queens Counties, men are already busy on lobster traps, boats and engines, and this work has to some extent, accounted for the reduction in the number of benefit claimants.

The weather will be the guiding factor within the next few weeks in deciding the employment trend. If it remains fine, and becomes warmer, there is no doubt, according to local Employment Officials, that many more men will return to work. If it remains blustery and cold, there will be delay in starting new construction work, and in increasing the working crews on jobs already under way.

Montague and Souris

At Montague the new Federal building is progressing steadily with ten bricklayers laying the brick walls of what will be the town's most modern structure. Many carpenters are also employed on the job.

Souris people are looking forward to the opening of the lobster fishing season now little more than two weeks ahead, and there is plenty of pre-season activity both in the town, and among the fishermen along the coasts of eastern Kings County.

The town's two lobster packing plants, Eastern Packers and Griffin Fisheries, are already lining up factory help, and there may not be enough to go around if fishing is good.

WORK AT BRIDGE

The work of removing the understructure of the new Montague bridge was completed this week. Workmen were engaged prior to this to remove the forms on which the concrete bridge was poured, after which the work of removing the piles was undertaken. A stout rope was tied to each pile and run through a pulley to a heavy truck. On the pull the pile was snapped off well below the mud surface of the bottom of the river. They were then floated to the boom, and dragged out to land. The men are now busy surfacing and polishing the concrete surface, which on completion should present a fine finish. At present also the government engineer is determining specifications and plans for the completion of the approaches. Not until final plans have been made will tenders will be called; however, it is thought that a matter of a few weeks will see the tenders being let, and the work get underway shortly thereafter.

Red Cross Drive Reaches \$15,000

Receipts to date in the 1954 Red Cross campaign totalling \$15,000 (87% of the objective) were reported at the monthly meeting of the Provincial Red Cross Executive held yesterday afternoon and presided over by Lt. Col. L. F. MacDonald. A breakdown of these contributions shows that \$8,824.39 has been collected in Charlottetown; \$5,327 from Special Names, \$2,351.85 from the General Canvass and \$1,155.64 from the Ladies' Committee. Queen's County has already turned in \$1,987.85, Prince County, \$460.41, King's County, \$445.25 while Summerside has collected \$3,234 so far.

Miss Jean MacLean, who has recently accepted the chairmanship of the Canadian Red Cross Corps Committee was welcomed by the president as a new member of the Executive. Miss MacLean stated that the Corps members were carrying on their regular visits to veterans in hospital, and that a meeting is to be held at Red Cross

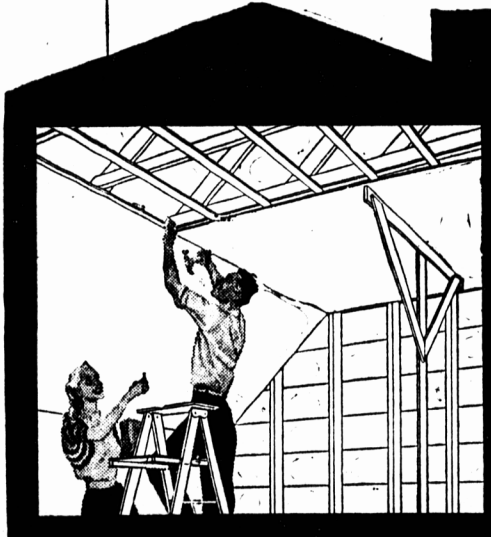

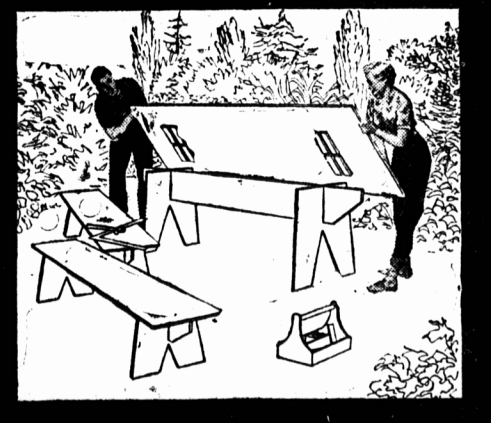

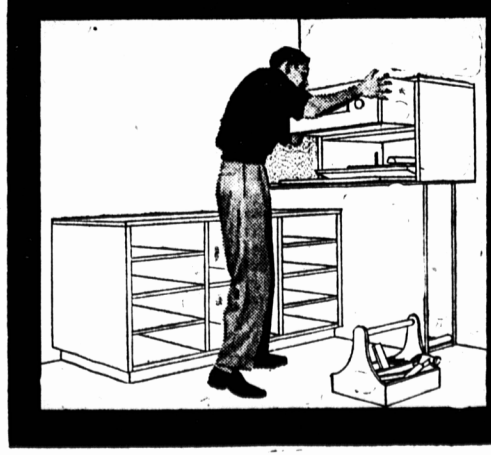
