

Lane Meets Joe Brown In Title Scrap Wednesday

HOUSTON, Tex. (AP)—Kenny Lane, a 26-year-old who insists he is not a lefthander, ends his two-year search for a lightweight title fight Wednesday night by challenging Joe Brown, who has had a steady training diet of southpaw sparring mates.

Brown, a 32-year-old Negro from New Orleans and Houston, is confident he can defend his title a fifth time with a fifth knockout. Lane, the No. 1 challenger from Muskegon, Mich., believes the age difference gives him an edge and predicts a knockout in the late rounds.

Lane has never been knocked off his feet in 57 fights. Brown has never lost to a lefthander.

The scheduled 15-round match, the second world's title bout here in less than three months, is expected to draw a crowd of 10,000 to the 11,200-seat Sam Houston Coliseum. The fight will be televised at 10 p.m. (EDT) (11 p.m. ADT) with the Houston area

blacked out.

WEIGHT NO PROBLEM
Neither fighter is expected to have difficulty making the 135-pound weight limit.

On May 7 Brown picked up \$40,000 as his share of a Texas record gate of \$68,740 as he scored an eighth-round technical knockout over Ralph Dupas of New Orleans.

The Brown and Lane camps exchanged rather sharp verbal blasts during the long contract negotiations that did not end until June 25.

Lane charged it practically took an act of Congress before Brown agreed to a title fight. Brown's backers resented support received by Lane from Michigan's Governor Soapy Williams and Senator Charles Potter.

"We'll have a chance now to see how good these politicians are as matchmakers," said Lou Vicusi, Brown's manager.

Vicusu also resents Lane's training camp remarks about Brown

being an "old man."

LAUGHS AT TAUNTS
Brown, training the last two weeks at Camp Holden, 20 miles northwest of Houston, has laughed off the "old man" tag by renewing his predictions of another knockout.

"It'll be too late for him to catch me in the stretch," the champion said. "He'll be down by the 10th and it'll be another win for me."

Lane and his co-managers, the veteran Jack Kearns and Pete Petroskey, moved into town last Tuesday after the challenger had trained 11 days in New Orleans while becoming accustomed to the hot, humid Gulf Coast area climate.

Both Lane and Kearns discounted Vicusi's strategy of importing four lefthanders to work with Brown.

"I'm a switch-hitter, not a lefthander," said Lane. "If the situation calls for a right hand stance, I'll use it, and, if not, I'll use a left hand."

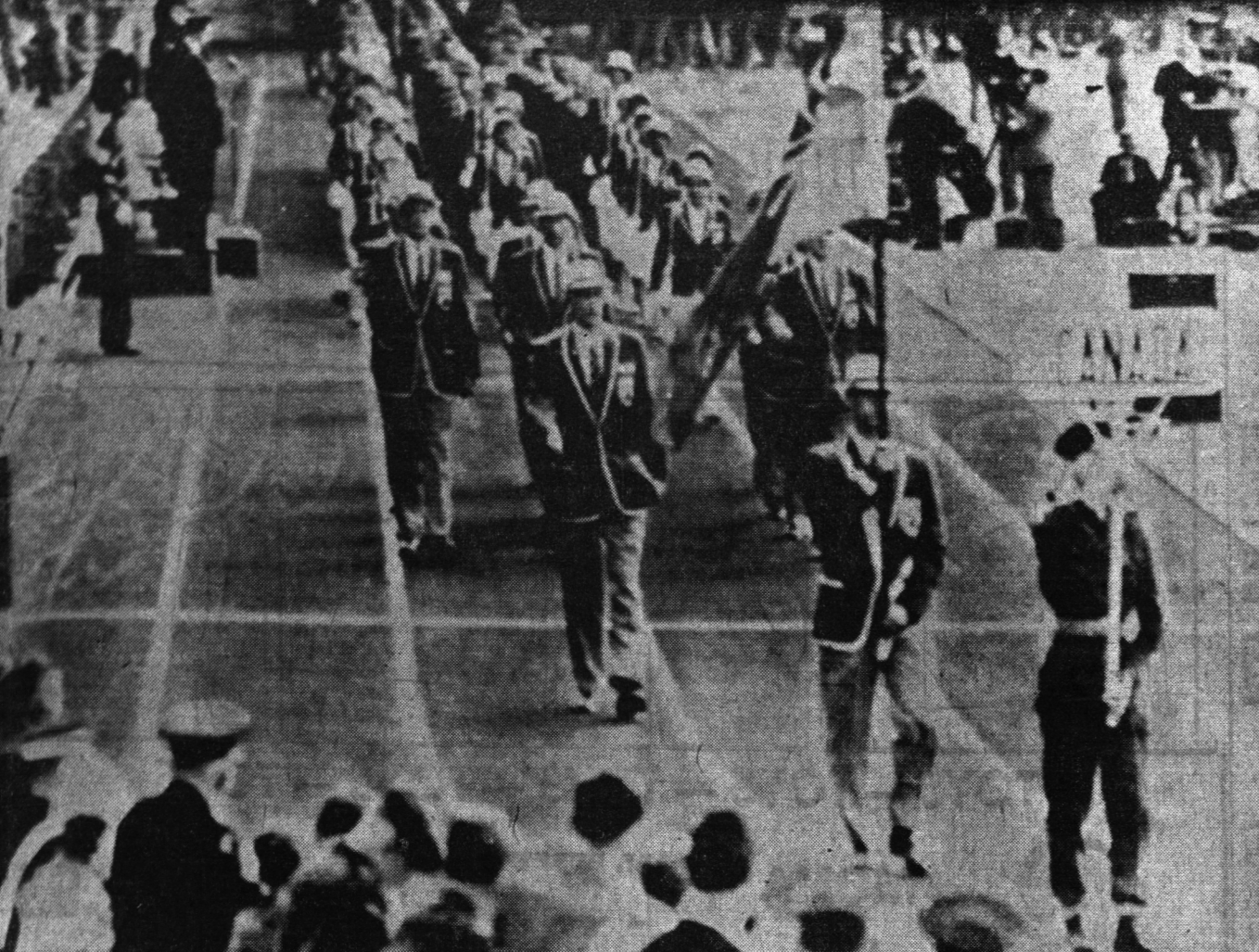

Canadians Take Share Of Glory At Cardiff Saturday

CARDIFF (CP)—One world record was broken, Games marks were shattered in wholesale bunches and heartbreaks and drama spotlighted the first full-scale program of the British Empire Games Saturday. Canada's athletes, laggards in international competition for years, pitched in to take their share of glory.

Competitors from 35 countries, a record in the games' 28-year history, flocked at venues spread over 200 miles, but the major spectator interest was concentrated over a square mile in the downtown section of the Welsh capital. At the Arms Park, track and field took over and at the Empire pool, just a discus throw away, the speed-crazy Australian swimmers occupied center stage.

The tally at the end of the day showed the dedicated Aussies at the top of the medalists' heap with winners of three of the eight gold medals at stake. England followed with two each.

ENGLAND IN FRONT
The unofficial point standings, on the basis of 10-5-4-3-2-1 for the first six placings in each final, put England into a narrow lead with 42 points, just two more than the Australians, who have ledged themselves to a first-place finish when the Games end next Saturday.

The Canadians, competing as if they had never heard of the more powerful Australians and Englishmen, battled for everything in sight. They took one second-place silver medal and four bronze medals for third-place efforts, smashed three games records and gained 21 points for third place in the standings.

In all, six games track and field records were broken.

Jamaica won gold medals in the 100-yard dash and the high jump for men. Australia took the silver in the women's shotput and England captured the men's javelin.

The Aussies won two medals in swimming and England took her second gold medal in the men's team foil.

The most brilliant and spine-tingling display over the 12 hours was given by a quartet of Aussie mermaids in the 440-yard freestyle relay. They whipped through the Empire Pool in the world record time of four minutes, 17.4 seconds to shatter their own world standard of 4:18.9 set in 1956.

HEARTBREAKS, DRAMA
The heartbreaks and drama came in the opening and closing events at Cardiff Arms Park—the men's high jump and the punishing six miles.

Chilla Porter, spindly-legged Australian and a "sure" gold medal-winner in the high jump, hunched on the sidelines with a second-place best of six feet eight inches while Ernie Haisley of Jamaica won with a record-breaking 6-9.

Porter had been on the sick list

SILVERSTONE, England (AP)—British racing driver Peter Collins Saturday won the 11th British Grand Prix in an Italian Ferrari.

Britain's Mike Hawthorn was second, also in a Ferrari.

Roy Salvadori of Britain was third in a Cooper. Stuart Lewis-Evans was fourth in a Vanwall and Harry Schell, Paris-based American, fifth in a B.R.M.

Australia's Jack Brabham was sixth in a Cooper.
