Judge Darby Re-Elected P. C. Hospital President

Only 50 of an anticipated 700 persons attended the annual meeting of the Prince County Hospital last evening in Summerside's Civic Auditorium. Most of those who did attend were Board members, members of the medical and nursing staff, representatives of various hospital organizations, and clergymen, with only a few interested citizens comprising the balance. Judge W.E. Darby, president of the Board of Trustees, and later re-elected to this office, presided. The work of the hospital was reflected in the detailed reports presented by the chairmen of the various committees, hospital Ladies Aids, and the Okto Club. DEFICIT REDUCED In his presidential report, Judge Darby noted that during the past three years there was a reduction in the recurring annual deficits. These reductions he said had been achieved only by the exercise of every reasonable economy, in conjunction with generous support through Century Club and membership drive contributions. The report of the former administrator, John E. Ledgerwood, revealed an average daily occupancy of 72 adults and children, 13 new born. During the year 3,284 patients were admitted to hospital and 2,887 out-patients received emergency or diagnostic treatment. In the maternity service, 723 new born were cared for. A total of 115,412 meals were served

Make Plans For Obtaining S'Side. Carnival Lobsters

Tentative plans to obtain lobsters in this Province for this year's lobster carnival in Summerside were discussed last evening at a regular meeting of the representatives of the various service clubs.

Mr. Charles Hogan, director of the carnival, outlined the proposed plans and the possibility of obtaining a license to operate a pound at Egmont Bay in which the lobsters may be kept until needed for the carnival in mid-July.

Mr. C.R. MacLagan, representing the Board of Trade, said that he had received assurance from the Minister of Fisheries, Hon. J. Angus MacLean, that he would in all possibility be able to come to Summerside to officially open the show.

Mr. Hogan said that he had been successful in having the Read's Corner Women's Institute sponsor the booth where rugs and mats will be displayed and that it is hoped that something in the way of a grant will be given by the Provincial Government to assist this venture.

Four-Year Sentence Is Given In Attempted Break Case

A four-year sentence in Dorchester Penitentiary was imposed on Patrick Victor MacInnis of Borden yesterday after a jury found him guilty of an attempted break at the Retail Vendors store in Borden on November 15, 1957.

Before sentence was passed by Mr. Justice George J. Tweedy, the Crown, represented by Mr. D.O. Stewart Q.C. called attention to 15 convictions, 13 for theft, that have been found against the 37-year-old prisoner, who has previously received four penitentiary sentences ranging from two to five years. He asked the court to consider imposing a sentence of preventative detention in the interest of public protection because the record of the accused indicated the will to reform was lacking and he had become an habitual criminal.

Judge Tweedy referred to the request of the defence counsel, Mr. George MacMahon, for consideration of the jury's request for mercy in their verdict of conviction, and noted that the jury had not been informed at any time concerning the previous record of convictions against the accused. He said he would act on the Crown's suggestion, if Mr. Stewart wished to make a motion to the court concerning the additional sentence of preventative detention. However the Crown moved in
