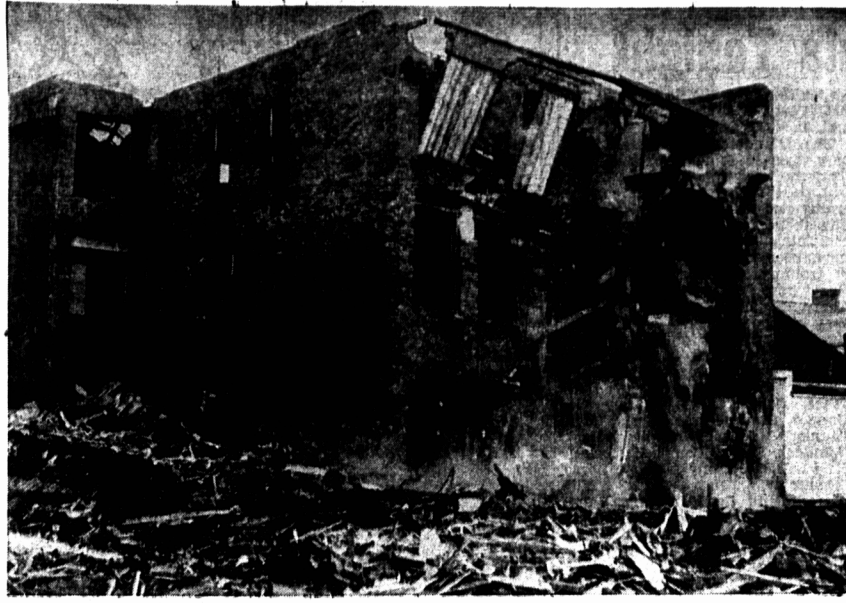


Riley Building Being Levelled



The Riley Building, one of the few brick structures on the site of the new Federal Building in Charlottetown was being demolished yesterday. It was built about the time of the First World War by the late T. B. Riley and was used originally as headquarters for the Bank of New Brunswick. In more recent years it was the site of the first office here of the Unemployment Insurance Commission. Work of clearing buildings from the site is progressing rapidly.

Space is reserved for the Ayrshire cattle of Fred I. Andrew, Charlottetown; the Estate of George L. Boswall of Charlottetown; Keith Boswell and sons of Victoria; A. MacRae and Son, Charlottetown; and Andrew B. and Fred T. MacRae.

Entries for the Jersey class have been made by Albert J. Boswall, Charlottetown; Fred Kilson of New Wiltshire; Edison B. Mutch, North River; and Douglas H. Matheson, St. Peter's Bay.

For the Guernsey class, entries have been dispatched from Ernest Nichol and Sons, Milton; Harold Palmer, Kensington; Owen Younker and Son of Kingston.

Among those entering Holstein cattle, in a bid to take top honors at the Winter Fair, are Colby C. Lewis and Son of Freetown, who will compete with many entries from all parts of Nova Scotia and Brunswick.

Sanderson and Borden of North River have made their entries in the Hereford class, and Athol Roberts of Southport in Shorthorn classes.

INTERNATIONAL CREDIT UNION FUNCTION AT THE CHARLOTTETOWN

International Credit Union Day movement in this City. They were sponsored by the Charlottetown Credit Union Chapter last night at the Clover Club. Mr. George Cheverie presided. The guest speaker was Rev. George Topashee of Sydney, N.S., who has been working with the Extension Department of St. Francis Xavier University for the past 11 years. Father Topashee is also a director of urban adult education in Cape Breton.

Guests at the meeting included His Honor Lieutenant Governor Frowse, Hon. Eugene Cullen, representing the Government of Prince Edward Island; Mr. Pieton McCormac, representing the City Council, and Rev. Monsignor Patrick McMahon.

About 140 members of Credit Unions from various parts of the Island sat down to a delicious turkey supper served by the ladies' auxiliary of the Charlottetown Branch of the Canadian Legion. Dinner music was provided by Messrs. Alex MacLean and Alfred McKearney.

Father Topashee spoke in general terms concerning the Credit Union and Co-operative movements, their plans in making democracy work and the necessity for education. He was introduced by Mr. Alex MacLean, president of the Canadian Brotherhood of Railway Employees. At the conclusion of his address he was thanked by Mr. Brendon O'Grady.

The speaker outlined conditions as they exist in the world today. He pointed out that two-thirds of the world are living in poverty, disease, illiteracy and starvation. He noted that sixteen colonial have been given their freedom since the last war. "These people," said Father Topashee, "wanted to be put on their own, but how can they govern themselves with such illiteracy?"

"We must have trained leadership and an informed people," he said. "If we are to give them democracy." The speaker went on to say that the co-operative movement, of which the Credit Union is the heart, is the bargaining agent for this primary producer, just as the labor union is the bargaining agent for the laboring man.

"We in the Maritimes, with the techniques that we have, can be the strongest bulwark in building nations and the greatest deterrent to Communism," said Father Topashee, who pointed out that students from all parts of the world have visited here to learn what they could about the co-operative movement so that they could return to their native land and start groups there.

Father Topashee gave a vivid description of what is termed "the people's school." He told of small kitchen groups meeting in the homes where they could learn the workings of a Credit Union and how that when these people had learned, they went on to organize other groups. "When we get this spirit of co-operation and concern for our fellowman, then justice will replace injustice; charity will replace selfishness; spiritually will replace materialism and Christianity will replace paganism," he concluded.

A pleasing feature of the evening was the presentation of "Founders" pins to three Charlottetown men who for a number of years have been active and done
