"CINDERELLA" AS A MEL-ODIOUS STORY, FILMED GOR-GEOUSLY BY WALT DISNEY

No other girl's name has so often been on the lips of women the world over for the last 300 years as that of the fabulous heroine of Walt Disney's spectacular, all-car-toon magical musical, "Cinderella" (at the Prince Edward Theatre to-day).

For the first time this most per-sistent of legends receives the rich romantic treatment it deserves, in any medium.
