Beef And Kidney Pudding Is Hearty British Fare

"IN general, foods served in Great Britain are more substantial than in many countries," the Chef remarked. "Perhaps because of the chilly climate, considerable rain, and scarcity of central heating in the homes."

"To me, one of the fine British soup combinations is the use of carrots in beef broth or consommé."

"A beef and kidney pudding is a dish to satisfy healthy appetites and a fine loaf of gingerbread, or plateful of small ginger cakes, is a treat for the evening meal, sometimes called 'high tea'."

DINNER FROM GREAT BRITAIN: Consomme with Shredded Carrot Garnish, Beef and Kidney Pudding, Brussels Sprouts with Lemon Butter, Lettuce Mustard Dressing, Orange Gingerbread, Coffee, Tea, Milk.

All Measurements are level
Beef and Kidney Pudding: Dice 1 1/2 lbs. round or chuck steak into 1/2 inch cubes. Stir in 1/2 tsp. meat tenderizer; let stand 20 min. at room temperature.

Prepare pastry for pudding as follows: Sift together 2 c. pre-sifted enriched flour, 2-3 tsp. salt and 1/4 tsp. baking powder. Stir in 2-3 c. chopped beef suet (or chop in 7 tbsp. shortening with

a pastry blender). Add 1-3 c. cold water or enough to moisten. Roll 1/4 in. thick on a floured surface and with it line a 3 pt. bowl.

To steak, add 2 tbsp. enriched flour, 1/4 tsp. salt, 1/4 tsp. pepper and 1/4 tsp. thyme. Arrange in crust-lined bowl together, if desired, with 2 diced, cleaned lamb kidneys. Add 1 c. beef broth. Fold over-hanging edges of crust over meat, enclosing it completely.

Place in kettle; pour in boiling water to depth of bowl. Cover and boil rapidly 2 hrs. Unmold on warm platter. Cut 1/2 in. hole in crust, and pour in c. boiling beef bouillon to make additional gravy.

Orange Gingerbread: Into a mixing bowl, measure 1/2 c. room temperature soft shortening. Blend in 1/2 tsp. salt, 1 tsp. sifted baking soda, 1 1/2 tsp. ground ginger, 1/2 tsp. each ground cinnamon and cloves and 1/2 c. sugar. When fluffy blend in 2-3 c. mild, light molasses.

Sift in 1/2 c. flour and 2 eggs, well beaten. Then alternately add 1 1/2 c. pre-sifted enriched flour and c. fresh orange juice. Turn into oiled waxed-paper-lined baking pan 9 x 9 x 2.

Mix 1-3 c. granulated sugar with 4 tsp. crushed grated orange rind and dust over top. Bake in mod. oven, 350 deg. F., for 55 min., or until a pic comes out clean when inserted near center. Cool 10 min. in pan. Turn out and cool completely.

Orange Gingerbread Muffins: Follow preceding recipe, but bake after in oiled 2 1/2 in. muffin pans. Takes 16.

TRICK OF THE CHEF
Add 1/4 c. sliced butterbrowned mushrooms to filling for Beef and Kidney Pudding.
