### Kurt Meyer Enjoys Brief Leave From Military Prison

OFFLEBEN, Germany, Nov. 26 (CP)—Kurt Meyer, German major-general sentenced to life imprisonment for war crimes, said today—in the midst of his first freedom in seven years—that he went to Canada as "a fanatical German" and came back to Germany "convinced that all nationalism is dead."

### Neighbors Keep Watch

This reporter went to Offleben to interview Meyer's wife and was amazed to step into a room where Meyer himself was romping with three of his five children. Neighbors keep a casual watch in nearby homes in case Communists tried to take him behind the Iron Curtain—only 300 yards away.

The man who is serving a life sentence because he was found responsible for shooting 18 Canadian prisoners-of-war in Normandy in 1944 said he'll return Saturday to Werl military prison where he was transferred recently from Canada.

Ironically, Werl is only a few miles from Soest, where Canada's 27th Brigade is going to be posted in 1952.

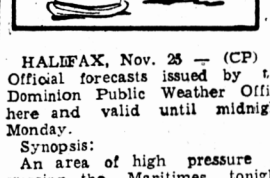
