

Montague Race Track Fans Saw Records Topple

Records toppled at the Montague race track yesterday when a fine-conditioned ovel giving a large crowd thrills in close finishes and fast racing.

Lowering their records were Dr. J. D. (2:17/4), owned and driven by Alfred Lowery, winner of the first dash D/D Pace to 2:16.4.

Uscita's Boy, owned by G. H. Brooks, driven by D. MacNeill, winner of the second dash D/D Pace to 2:15/4.

Royal Train, (2:20), owned by Dr. P. MacIntyre, driven by A. Llewellyn, winner of the first dash C/Trot to 2:19/2.

All Budlong, (2:17/4), owned and driven by Randall MacDonald, winner of the second dash C/Trot to 2:16.

June Breeze, (2:18/1), owned and driven by K. P. Cudmore, winner of the first Dash C Pace to 2:15.

Almost every dash was a blanket finish with the lead horses fighting neck and neck for top positions. From the word go by starter Abbott, the drivers kept the horses bunched twice around the track to give the thrilling finishes witnessed yesterday.

It was a perfect day for the races, clear sky and cool breeze, and the horses and track in prime condition. Frank Acorn as announcer kept up a running commentary on each race for the fans who were unable to see the backstretch, a practice which adds considerably to the interest and enthusiasm of the race. There was pari-mutuel betting for those who like to chance the odds, and the daily-double paid off \$95.00 on Royal Train and June Breeze. Canteen services were supplied by the ladies of the Beaver Club.

Mr. George MacIntyre was commended for the excellent condition of the track which in no small measure accounted for the lowering of five records in eight races.

Blue Bombers In Another Court Wrangle

WINNIPEG (CP)—Winnipeg Blue Bombers, with a 2-0 record in previous court cases, are hoping to make it three straight when their legal department goes after quarterback Bobby Freeman and centre Jack Locklear, both graduates of Auburn University.

The two players were signed by the Western Interprovincial Football Union club last January, but both were scheduled to report Tuesday night to the training camp of the Cleveland Browns of the National Football League, jumping their Bomber contracts.

Coach Paul Brown of Cleveland, who drafted the pair last spring although they had signed with Winnipeg, said they had asked for tryouts with the Browns. He also claimed they were subject to military draft and were told not to leave the United States.

After an emergency meeting of the Bomber management committee, club president Ralph Misener issued the statement:

"We have instructed our legal advisors to take appropriate action to enforce the contracts. From our experience in the past, we believe there is no basis for the statement regarding their military status."

Bombers were involved in court cases with two other American teams over players in 1951.

In both cases, however, Bombers had the players involved and the American teams had the contracts. But the bombers won the legal tussle. This time, the shoe is on the other foot.

While the Winnipeg club has issued no statement as to what action will be taken, it was assumed it will ask for an injunction to prevent the players from even working out with the Browns. The case likely will be heard in Cleveland.

Top Money

MILWAUKEE, (AP)—Dr. Cary Middlecoff won the Milwaukee open golf tournament Sunday with a 15-under-par 265 and became the year's top money winner.

Middlecoff, the 1955 Masters and Western open winner, finished the tournament with a two-under-par 69 Sunday to win \$6,000 first prize and a \$3,000 automobile. His earlier rounds were 64-67-66.

Will Be In Grey Cup Parade

WINNIPEG (CP)—Mayor George Sharpe says Winnipeg is not going to "buy a pig-in-poke" when it comes to floats in Vancouver's Grey Cup parade.

"But they'll know we're there—football wise and otherwise," he said Monday. "First we want to make sure what we're getting before we spend taxpayers money on parades."

Mayor Sharpe was answering Vancouver's reaction to his statement Friday in agreeing with Alderman Walter Crawford that Grey Cup parades are "utter nonsense."

Vancouver was so sure that Mayor Sharpe will change his mind it has already reserved a reviewing seat for him.

He said civic finance committee Friday merely deferred action on Vancouver's request for Winnipeg plans for the parade until it sized up the situation.

Football Star Quitting Game

EDMONTON (CP)—The surprise retirement from football of Frankie Morris, star guard with the 1954 Grey Cup champion Edmonton Eskimos, was announced Friday by the club's front office.

Morris, one of the best native-born defensive linemen, wants to devote full time to his family and business, officials said. The 31-year-old former co-captain of the Eskimos is a car salesman here.

Toronto-born Morris was a member of the Western Interprovincial Football Union squad since 1950. His senior football career began with a Canadian Navy team in 1942. He joined Toronto Argonauts in 1945 where he stayed until coming to Edmonton.

Downed Bedard

"McDonald is our top player and he's in top form," said Penner. McDonald played at Wimbledon in 1953 and 1954. In a friendly match at Cambridge earlier this year, he downed second-seeded Canadian ace Bob Bedard 10-8, 8-10, 8-6, 6-4.

Bedard, from Sherbrooke, Que., is expected to be named one of two Canadian singles players to compete in the matches. Top-seeded Lorne Main of Toronto likely will be the other.

The second-round tie consists of four singles matches and one doubles match. Canada was granted a bye in the first round and Pakistan defaulted to the West Indies.

West Indies-Canadian Match To Be Warm Battle

 MONTREAL, (CP)—A three-man British West Indies team with little previous experience in Davis Cup play promised a warm battle against a four-man Canadian squad in a second-round tie starting Friday.

"It certainly shapes up as a close contest," said manager Arnold Penner of Port of Spain, Trinidad, out with the team for a practice session on grass courts at west-end Mount Royal Tennis Club.

However, only one member of the B. W. I. team—22-year-old playing captain Ian McDonald—has seen previous Davis Cup action. McDonald bowed to Gardner Malloy of the United States in the 1953 playdowns at Kingston, Jamaica.

He was unable to compete in last year's matches because of academic commitments at Cambridge University, England.
