MONCTON, N. B., June 25 (CP)—Possible entry of Charlottetown into the Maritime Senior Hockey League next season was discussed at a meeting of the league here today with representatives of the Island capital. League president Judge J. Hudson, Halifax, presided.

Also discussed was the new "super series" announced by the C.A.H.A. at its annual meeting earlier this month. Bryce Love, New Glasgow, president of the M.A.H.A., gave additional details on the C.A.H.A. meeting and the plans for lifting leagues from Allan Cup status.

The M.S.H.L. will request a meeting with the executive of the Cape Breton Senior League, it was decided, so that the two major Maritime leagues will be in agreement when the matter of a new class is brought before the next meeting of the C.A.H.A. slated for July 22 at Toronto.

The Charlottetown delegation explained the situation in regard to the proposed new team. League officials explained the working of the M.S.H.L. Charlottetown possibly will make a formal application for entry to the league at the next meeting, July 15, at Truro, N.S.

Keen Racing As Second Night Meet Of Season Is Run Off At Local Track

The second night racing program of the season was another big success at the Exhibition track on Saturday night when a total of 33 trotters and pacers took part in ten one-mile dash events to produce some thrilling track duels and thrilling finishes that gave a large crowd some really excellent racing.

Miss Knox, owned by Commander G. H. Buntain and driven by Len O'Meara, was the big winner of the night when she paced her way to firsts in the seventh and tenth events on the card. The bay mare won both events by putting on powerful drives from the three-quarter mark on to clip off their leading entries down the stretch to the wire. Rhodola D. was also consistent to capture second place honors in the same events.

Mary Merk, with Earle Semple in the sulky, and Josedale Clipper, driven by James MacGregor, shared top honors in the speed department for the night when they both covered the mile in 2:13. Mary Merk made her time in winning the fifth dash, followed closely by the Clipper for second, while in the ninth, the positions were reversed with the big grey gelding coming through a winner in a driving finish down the stretch.

One of the most exciting events of the night was the third dash, when an eight-horse field battled it out for positions all along the route to come up with some very close racing. Shy Ann 2nd, Tiny Budlong, New Look and Bee Budlong made it a continual battle for the lead position with Tiny finally taking over at the upper turn only to be beaten out in a driving finish by New Look and Johnny Kalmuck. A blanket would have covered all eight horses coming under the wire and it took a photo finish to finally sort out the winners. The same field, performing in the eighth event, saw Tiny Budlong go out in front at the first turn and stay on top all the way although challenged by O. U. Volo. Tryon and Bee Budlong in the early part of the race, and just nosing out the Budlong horse and Johnny Kalmuck, who finished in that order at the wire.

Lillian Budlong and Ma Cherie were the big winners in the first and fourth dashes respectively. Lillian was showing in front at the wire in the opening event of the night, closely pressed by Ma Cherie, Calumet Onward and Direct Volo in that order, while in the fourth, Ma Cherie came from a third place position to nip Mary's Delight and Random Harvest coming down the stretch. Lusticia, Nell Kalmuck, Bonnie Dale and Valley Long did the battling for honors in the second and sixth events of the night. Led by Valley Long in the second for most of the race with Jolly Har-

vester and Bonnie Dale challenging, driving finishes by Lusticia and Nell around the upper turn and down the stretch saw them finish in that order with Bonnie clipping the third position. Taking an early lead in the sixth event, Nell Kalmuck came home a winner, pressed closely by Valley Long and Lusticia in a tightly packed field to finish in that order.

Ralph Kiner, the Pittsburgh Pirate big gun, was the most popular man in Brooklyn today. Here's what he did to the town's beloved Dodgers Sunday as Pittsburgh took a 16-11 National League triumph:

Blasted a pair of three-run homers;

Hit a triple, double and single;

Drove in eight runs;

Scored four runs himself.

Kiner's 17th and 18th homers, featured a 20-hit Pirate bombardment against seven Brooklyn pitchers. Ted Beard also homered for

the Pirates and Gil Hodges for the Dodgers.

The home-run king's initial sock with two on in the first put young Vernon Law off to a three-run lead over Don Newcombe, who was knocked out in the third. Kiner's single opened the two-run third-inning rally with two out.

The Pittsburgh star's double off Ralph Branca, who took the loss, broke the deadlock in the seventh. He got a triple off Erv Palica in the eighth and made it out with his three-run homer off Rex Barney in the five-run ninth.

At Philadelphia, the Phillies and Chicago Cubs divided a doubleheader, a sweep of their doubleheader with the Giants at New York. The three homers gave the Reds a second-game 6-4 victory after they had won the opener, 6-3.

In the American League Hoot Evers blasted a three-run homer in the eighth of the nightcap to get Detroit Tigers a 6-3 decision over New York Yankees at Detroit. The victory kept the league-leading Tigers three games out in front of the Yankees, who won the opener 8-2.

A spill on the first bend in the first race was the only mishap, when the Halifax horse Calumet Pearl hooked with Alice T. Clegg on the first bend. Merle Direct, also from Halifax, was the winner in a close finish with Lombardy Peler of Truro.

A favorite, Neida Hanover, owned by Pictou County's W. D. Webster, nosed out Nova G. from Halifax to win the second dash and coupled with Merle Direct paid \$52 to the daily double winners.

Quaker's Boy was top favorite in the third event—the Dartmouth horse came from behind in the back stretch to lead the field. Interference cost Starlight Eclipse first money in the fourth dash. The dash was given Amherst's O. K. Volo. In the repeat performance Dr. L. B., from Halifax, copped the heat after being forced down the stretch.

The No. 5 race, a classified pacing event, and the repeat in the final race, saw the closest contest of the night. Single Streak, Dartmouth-owned and reined by veteran reinsman Johnny Conroy, won by a head, nosing out the favorite Seven-Up Direct, which placed second.

The last quarter of this event was the fastest of the night in 31 seconds. Matched again in the final card, these two classy entrants again made it a great race, this time Seven-Up winning in the stretch and in doing so chopping 1-2 seconds off his time. Buster C., owned by Dr. J. A. Donahoe of Truro, was third in both races. Joey Harvester, the favorite, won the only other dash with Roy Shelburne following closely. All dashes were for \$200.
