New Brunswick Curator Gives Talk To Historical Society

"A wise nation preserves its records, remembers its heritage and fosters a national pride," said Mr. W. Austin Squires, curator of the New Brunswick Museum speaking at a general meeting of the Historical Society of Prince Edward Island, Judge H.L. Palmer presided. His Honour Lt. Governor T.W.L. Provost accompanied by his aide, Lt. Col. A.W. Rogers, was present for the meeting.

Mr. Squires pointed out that one of the first things Communists did when they invaded any country was to destroy the museums and all historical monuments. They then replaced these with things dealing with their own ideals.

The speaker said that museums play an important part in the culture of a country. "Schools and colleges deal with stereotyped phases while a museum can reach every age and is not limited in its knowledge whether it be science, history or art."

Mr. Squires dwelt for some time describing the three museums of Saskatchewan where he is curator. He thought it would be a good idea to preserve the story of western development.

WEALTH OF MATERIALS
He was interested to know that there was a movement afoot in Prince Edward Island to start a museum. He felt that there should be a wealth of materials which could be derived from the old sailing days; from agricultural implements and from military sources.

"A museum is an educational institution which is able to impart knowledge which actually gives pleasure. And when a person goes to a place that they enjoy, they learn unconsciously," he said.

To start a museum, Mr. Squires said it was necessary for some historical society to take the lead. It is their responsibility to assemble a collection but very early should be on its own, functioning under its own officers.

Mr. Squires said a museum of most museums were financed by public appropriation. Some of them change a small admission fee which helps defray expenses. He emphasized the fact that bequests and endowments are important to any institution of this sort. To this he added the income from membership of private members.

SERVICES RENDERED
In dealing with the services rendered to a community by a museum, Mr. Squires said that one of its main purposes was to correct confused and erroneous information that is contained in books and other historical data. He felt that naturalists have contributed more to society than some economic geographers.

The job of collecting and classifying material has been of untold benefit to mankind. As an example of this, Mr. Squires related the story of an insect which threatened to destroy the sugar crop of the Mauritius Island. Some of the insects, Mr. Squires said that one of the Royal Museum in London; there they were classified as an insect common to the West Indies; soon the insects which fed on the sugar cane pest were shipped to the Mauritius Island and the crop was saved.
