At a meeting of the electors of Moncton a few nights ago it was decided to run a straight temperance ticket for mayor and councillors in that town. Candidates were named and committees appointed to circulate requisitions. There are 68 women voters on the lists this year in a total of 884.

The Industrial Gazette of St. Louis makes the announcement that there has just been uncovered near Tuscaloosa, Ala., a bed of red hematite iron ore 16 feet thick, which analyzes 62 1/2 per cent of metallic iron, and is believed to be the most extensive and valuable deposit of the kind in the United States.

An interesting event took place at the residence of Mrs. Robert Schurman, Upper Free-town, on Thursday evening last, 3rd inst., when Mr. W. G. Schurman, of Bedeque, and Miss Ada B. Schurman, of Free-town, were united in wedlock. The bride was tastefully attired in seal brown gros-grained silk, trimmed with plush and natural flowers. Among the many presents to the bride were some valuable ones from Rev. D. G. McDonald, of Boston, Dr. J. G. Schurman, of New York, and Mr. Geo. W. Schurman, of Halifax, (brother of the bride.) The Rev. J. J. Skinner performed the ceremony.

It is stated that under the terms of the renewed treaty between Austria, Italy and Germany, Italy agrees to place 200,000 troops at the disposal of Austria in the event of war with Russia, and to place the same number at the disposal of Germany in the event of war with France. Spain will not go beyond armed neutrality in the event of an outbreak of hostilities. The building of cavalry huts and barracks along the Carl Ludwig railway has caused a panic in Galicia. Large numbers of well-to-do people are selling their property and moving to Vienna.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

(SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.)

A Rising Suppressed.

SOZLA, March 4, 1887.

The rising at Rut. chuk has been entirely suppressed. All insurgent officers were either taken prisoners, killed or wounded in battle with the loyal troops, or were drowned. The pioneers, after arresting the loyal officers and commander of the garrison, summoned the infantry to surrender, which they refused to do. Firing then began and the mutineers were attacked by the militia and forced to retire. They were pursued and driven into the Danube by the infantry. The pioneers took to boats, and endeavored to escape, but their boats were stopped by a gunboat, and they were compelled to yield. The Loyalists entered Silistria without opposition. They found there the corpse of Colonel Krstoff, commander of the garrison, who had been killed by the men.

RUTSCHUK, March 4.

The killed and wounded in the outbreak here number 100.

A Military Council.

VIENNA, March 4.

At a military conference to-day, presided over by the Emperor, it was decided to appoint several officers for superior commands. In the event of war the Crown Prince will command one army corps. The erection of wooden huts for the troops in Galicia is proceeding rapidly, forts are being armed, ammunition and provisions are being stored, and the construction of strategic railway lines is being hastened, there being 470 men now at work. The preparations are causing great anxiety in Galicia, and it is feared that in the event of an Austro-Russian war the Austrian troops will be withdrawn from the defensive line in the Carpathians. A report is credited in Polish circles to the effect that the Emperor, in conversation with a Galician nobleman who had referred to these fears, said: "If war breaks out with Russia we are determined to defend Galicia."

Steamer Ashore.

LONDON, March 4.

The Red Star Line steamer Wesland, Capt. Euberg, from New York Feb. 29 for Antwerp, has gone ashore on Goodwin Sands in the fog. The passengers and crew were taken off by a tug and landed at Deal. The Wesland is a screw steamer of 3521 tons, and was built at Glasgow in 1867.

DeLesseps on the Move.

LONDON, March 4.

A despatch from Berlin to the Morning Post says: M. DeLesseps is coming here to offer French neutrality in the event of war in eastern Europe in exchange for Germany's support of the Egyptian question in conformity with French aspiration.

Given to the Conservatives.

OTTAWA, March 4.

On the recount L'Assomption and Mas-kinge are given to the Conservatives. The closer the analysis of the votes in the general elections the more evident it is that the young men gave their first votes for the Conservatives.

Depreciating Securities.

MONTREAL, March 4.

The Canadian Pacific authorities have detectives on the look out for the perpetrators of an attempt to depreciate C. P. R. securities. Some compromising arrests will shortly follow.

The Closure Debate.

LONDON, March 4.

In spite of the pressure of a section of the Cabinet, in favor of coercion, the council yesterday decided to conclude the closure debate before the production of the Crimes Bill.

The Algoma Election.

PORT ARTHUR, March 4.

All election returns for Algoma are in, except Rainy River, Fort Francis and Manitoulin Island. Dawson's majority so far is 58.

Called to the Senate.

MONTREAL, March 4.

The Witness says Mr. L. A. Senecal has been called to the Senate.

A State of Siege.

LONDON, March 4.

A state of siege has been proclaimed at Sofia.

Scarth's Majority.

WINNIPEG, March 4.

The recount gives Scarth a majority of four.
