Mr. Chapleau is in New York in good health and spirits, and is expected in Ottawa in a few days. L. E. Prowse is opening to-day his spring stock of English Hats, all the latest styles, cheaper than ever. The students of Toronto University have organized a rowing club to compete in American college matches. PATERSON has backed out of the skating rink with Elliott of Montreal, which was to take place in St. John. She broke the harbor ice on the wharf to-day, and will leave for Pictou on Monday morning. MONTREAL Customs Officials seized about \$1000 worth of fancy goods, on the 28th, for adulterating said to belong to Barker, President & Co., of New York. NEW OPENING, at the London House, part of fifty-five cases and bales English and Canadian Goods, per "Northern Light," which has been lying over in Pictou.—Geo. DAVIES & Co. The keeper of a fashionable restaurant in Montreal, decamped with all his money \$20,000 leaving his family behind. He has been traced to New York and it is expected there is a lady in the case. LADIES' LINED COLLARS, just opened, at Young's. The lecture delivered by Mr. James H. Bodin, before the Catholic Literary Union, last evening, on "Great Story Tellers," was well written, well delivered, and very interesting. The subject was ably handled, and Mr. Bodin showed that he gave it a great deal of careful study. We hope to hear Mr. Bodin on similar subjects in future. A BOY named Horne appeared before the Magistrate this forenoon, charged with assaulting his father and mother. The parents are fourteen years of age, but the charge preferred against him by his father, would do honor to a rascal much older. It was proven that he not only drew blood from his father's nose, but fired knives and forks at his mother. The father asked protection of the Court, and the Magistrate ordered that the boy leave his parents within a week, or he would imprison him for a month. We think a whipping in his case would have more effect than a month's imprisonment. A PECULIAR strike is on foot in Orange County, N. Y. The farmers want four cents a quart for their milk. The middlemen who buy it to ship in New York refuse to pay more than three and a-half cents. Many of the farmers refuse to sell, but they cluster around the depot and spill all the milk that may be offered at less than four cents. The sheriff will not interfere, being in sympathy with the four-cent men, who elected him. It is an interesting little war for half a cent, but New Yorkers are congratulating themselves on being sure of their milk supply so long as the chalk mines and hydrants remain faithful. Two and four button Black Kid Gloves, just opened, at Young's. TEMPERANCE IN NEWFOUNDLAND.—In a place called Greenspond, Newfoundland, they had an election the other day to determine whether the local option liquor law should go into operation, and the prohibitionists carried it by 126 votes against 37. A correspondent of one of the local newspapers gives the following election incident: One old lady, worked hard and successfully with all who passed her house, and leaped for joy when the result was known. Another lady had a pole protruding to the top of which was a Tea-pot, surmounted with a Woman's Head. This symbol was carried with the Union Jack and temperance flag, and was carried through the settlement by the friends of the temperance cause, which, I suppose, "made up quite a respectable crowd." The day after the election flags were hoisted in every part of the harbor. NEW FINDINGS, splendid value, just opened, at Young's. ATTEMPTED SUICIDE BY A MURDERER.—A passenger on the Quebec express, going to Halifax on the 28th inst., shot himself while in the Pullman car, shortly after the train left Atford Station. He was lying in his berth about 8 o'clock when the other passengers, including several ladies, were startled by hearing reports from a revolver. In a few moments the whole train load was alarmed. Conductor Stronach rushed into the Pullman and seized the man's hand just as he was about to discharge the sixth shot at his head. On examination it was found that two of the bullets had grazed his head, inflicting a slight flesh wound on each side. The other shots had apparently missed their intended mark, one being found in the woodwork of the berth. The man, who had got on the train north of Moncton, was partially under the influence of liquor at the time. Telegrams were forwarded to Truro, and on reaching there he was examined by a Doctor and removed to a hotel. Detective Power, of Halifax, arrived by a late train and arrested the man, who, he is instructed, is Herbert W. Eaton, who, a few days ago shot his brother and partner in business, Joseph W. Eaton, and another man named Samuel Kelly, jr., at Calais, Me., the latter of whom has since died. The prisoner attempted suicide to be removed at present from the hotel. The man travelling with Eaton said he is his brother, made some resistance against the detective's entrance, but was finally admitted and allowed him to enter without violence.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

(SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.) DOMINION PARLIAMENT. The Budget. OTTAWA, March 31. Sir Leonard Tilley, Minister of Finance, delivered the Budget Speech yesterday afternoon. The estimated receipts last year were \$34,800,000, and the expenditure \$28,850,000. The surplus is \$6,000,000. This, with one and three-quarter millions received from land sales, and with the Savings Bank deposits, will enable the Government to pay off \$7,000,000 of the public debt. The revenue estimated by Sir Leonard for next year is \$32,250,000; the expenditure estimated is \$30,000,000, and the surplus expected \$3,000,000. A number of changes have been made in the tariff. Tobacco has been reduced from twenty-five cents per pound to twelve cents; copper for composite shipbuilding will be admitted for three years free of duty; a bounty of one dollar and fifty cents per ton is proposed to be given on all pig iron made in Canada. Sir Leonard spoke three hours and a half. His speech was excellent and created a splendid impression on the House. He was followed by Mr. Patterson of Brant, who spoke for three hours in reply. Winter Communication. Senator Haythorne, yesterday, read a paper before the Committee appointed to inquire into the best means of Communication between this Island and the Mainland. He approved of screw steamers, and thought a permanent route should be established between Georgetown and the Mainland. Mr. McCarthy's Bill. A deputation of one hundred and fifty gentlemen, representing Boards of Trade, Railway and Steamship Companies, opposed Mr. Dalton McCarthy's Railway Bill before the Committee yesterday. Telegraph Notes. The Emperor William has so far recovered as to be able to attend to the affairs of state. Two men who had in their possession a quantity of gun cotton have been arrested at Dover, Eng. The fourth centennial anniversary of the birth of Raphael was celebrated at Rome, on the 28th March, with great pomp. Twenty-one of the twenty-six persons arrested at Ballinrobe, Ireland, for complicity in the murder of Feerick, in June, 1880, have been released. The London Times anticipates that Mr. Childers, Chancellor of the Exchequer, will have on hand at the end of March a minimum surplus of £1,500,000. The central body of the Ladies' Land League, resolved to hold a mass meeting early in April to raise funds to present to Parnell on his arrival in New York. A despatch from Berlin says the Vatican is inclined to facilitate a settlement with Prussia and that Cardinal Ledochowski, whose presence at the Vatican is regarded by Prussia as hindering a settlement, is about to leave there. M. Leon Say, speaking at Lyons on the 28th strongly advocated the opening of fresh outlets for commerce, which, he said, would be of more advantage to France than protection. France should keep close rapport with her offshoots abroad and even with those now under the tri color. A Portland, Me., despatch of the 27th says:—"Henry A. Gooding, of Yarmouth, on Saturday, at six o'clock, returned from hunting, and as he entered the yard he was met by Josiah Loring. Gooding let Loring inspect his gun, and when Loring handed it back it was accidentally discharged, killing Gooding instantly. He leaves a widow and one child. A meeting of the committee of the Irish National Land League was held in Dublin on the 28th. Timothy D. Sullivan, Member of Parliament for West Meath, presided. He repudiated the charge that the League was connected with the Irish dynamite party in America. O'Donovan Rossa and Sir Wm. Harcourt Home Secretary, he said, "must fight their own battles." Edward Hanlan, the oarsman, who is soon to row a race with Kennedy near Boston, and who is now in training on the Potomac, said to a reporter in Washington on the 28th, in the presence of Kennedy, that a statement had recently been made and printed in various papers of the country, which is likely to raise doubts as to the fairness and honesty of the forthcoming races. He desired to say in explanation of his coming to Washington, where his opponent lived, that when his adviser in Boston suggested his going south to train, he came to this city (Washington) because it was the only place in the south where he had friends, having made friends here on the occasion of his races with Courtney and Riley. A subsequent suggestion of his adviser that he go to Richmond was not received until after he had accepted the hospitality of his friends in Washington, and definitely settled there. He said he should stay in the city until advice that the water and boat-house accommodations at Silver Lake were suitable for training when he would go there. He wished to be distinctly understood that Plaisted, whose presence in Washington at this time had been commented upon in a manner unfavorable to him (Hanlan), came here without his knowledge; that Plaisted is not and will not be with him during the preparations, "and that he does not want him around." Finally, he said, "Kennedy and I are friends, but we are going to row a square, honest race, and the best man will win."
