Literature Said Best Way To Understanding

The annual St. Dunstan's University lecture series concluded last night with guest speaker Jean Ethier-Blais speaking on the literary tradition of French Canada.

This was the second lecture in a project for the supplying of a new lease on life to tradition, the speaker said. "The whole conception of life was exploded when Gabrielle Roy published her famous novel in 1944. The Tin Flute which describes French-Canadians as they really were at the beginning of the war in 1939. It was the first realistic novel which depicted French Canada without the help of ideologies."

PERSONAL MESSAGE
Mr. Ethier-Blais said French Canadian literature today had a personal message. It tries to represent French Canada as it is and is often despairing, a n d e r a d. "But," he said "it symbolizes the fact that today French Canadians have accepted the idea that literature is art, a way of self-expression, a method of interpreting reality and not a means of propaganda. Geo'town Constable Resigns; Shopping Centre Approved

GEORGETOWN — The resignation of Ernest MacLean, police officer of the town of Georgetown was accepted last night by the town council at the regular March meeting held in the council chambers last night.

Const. MacLean stated in his resignation that he would continue in his duties until the council could procure a replacement. The council accepted the resignation.

Mayor A. Kennedy presided at the meeting and a full slate of councillors were in attendance. Reports were heard from the finance public property, police and lights, fire engine, sanitation.

Old School's Fate To Be Discussed

MONTAGUE — A special meeting of Montague school district No. 3 will be held tonight to determine the fate of the old Memorial School. This school issue has been unsettled since the annual meeting nearly one year ago.

At that meeting a motion to sell the school and property to the Montague Branch of the Royal Canadian Legion for the sum of \$1 carried. Previous to the motion a discussion took place in which the school board made it clear it was willing to sell the school building but not the land, with the building to be removed from the premises.

The chairman of the board, Gilbert Clements, pointed out to the ratepayers present that they should consider the facts very carefully as the vote would be final. The motion to sell to the Legion, land and building, carried. However, the wording of the motion caused some dispute and the board under the authority of the Schools Act apparently does not have to dispose of school property even though the ratification of the grant is received along with instructions as to the method of administration of the grant.

Jail Escapee Is Quickly Recaptured

GEORGETOWN — David Smith, 17, Charlottetown, a prisoner in the Kings County jail at Georgetown was recaptured within 20 minutes of escaping custody last night.

At about 8 p.m. the jailer in the performance of his duty proceeded to the rear of the jail to check on the inmates there and Smith seized the opportunity to run from the jail through the courtyard corridor to the street.

Working on duty at the time, Chester Walker notified the town police officer Ernest MacLean and RCMP Constable Lena who was in Georgetown at the time.

About 20 minutes later Capt. Jack Mair and Everett MacLean discovered the escapee in a parked car on the outskirts of town.

He was on their approach but was quickly caught and returned to custody. Smith is awaiting trial on a series of theft charges and thefts in various Kings County centers.
