

Open House Is Due Today At New Guardian Home

SUMMERSIDE BUREAU OF THE GUARDIAN

With final touches just completed on the new building which is the Summerside home of The Guardian, in association with The Evening Patriot a brief event this afternoon will mark its official opening.

Mayor W. A. Currie is scheduled to provide the ceremonial touch at 4.15 this afternoon, following which Summerside friends of the two papers will be welcomed at an open house which will extend into the evening.

The building has been in use since July 17 but it was decided to delay the open house until the new signs, erected on Wednesday, were in place. There will be refreshments for the papers' guests at today's event.

ONE OF FINEST

In keeping with the Summerside Bureau's job of supplying a complete newspaper service to Summerside and much of Prince County, the new building is rated as one of the finest newspaper offices in its class in Canada. It is one storey, of concrete block and brick construction, 41 feet by 30 feet, and fronts on three streets.

Situated on the Federal Building and the community's business centre, the building has its main entrance on Central Street, a truck entrance on St. Stephen Street, and also extends

along First Street. The construction contract was handled by M. F. Schurman Co. Ltd.

Facilities for news, photographic, advertising and circulation departments have been provided. There is new furniture throughout.

SPACIOUS OFFICE

The spacious main office, which serves primarily as a news room, is finished in pastel tones of rose and green, with white ceiling and green and cream tile floors, and has nine banks of fluorescent lights. The inter-bureau teletype equipment, providing a continuous news link with other offices of The Guardian and The Patriot in Alberton, Charlottetown and Montserrat, is in the main office.

There is a separate business office, finished in a pastel shade of lime, while the large circulation room, where carrier boys and girls receive their papers for delivery, is finished in grey.

Since the seven-member staff occupying the new building in-

clude two reporter-photographers, the photographic dark room is one of its important features. An oil furnace in a boiler room supplies heat through hot water baseboard radiant heaters. There are two washrooms.

COMPLETE SERVICE

Up until the time of last February's fire, the offices of The Guardian and The Patriot were in the MacArthur Estate Building. Following the fire they were in the Smallman Building until the new building was occupied in mid-July.

Members of the Summerside Bureau staff are George Clow, manager and advertising sales and service; George Wotton and Roy Turner, reporter-photographers; Jack Hopkirk, circulation; Norman Macdonald, and advertising and business office, finished in a pastel shade of lime, while the large circulation room, where carrier boys and girls receive their papers for delivery, is finished in grey.

Both The Guardian and The Evening Patriot provide complete carrier delivery service from the new building.

IN MEMORIAM

JAMES MATTHEW CAHILL

There passed peacefully away at Beach Grove on July 11th 1958 James Matthew Cahill in his 37th year.

Mr. Cahill or "Jim" as he was fondly known by his many friends, was born at Kildare, P. E. I., son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Cahill.

Possessed of a very jovial nature he was loved by all who knew him.

In 1892 he married Mary Alice Mullyaly who predeceased him in 1949. His early life was spent at Kildare, engaged in the fishing business.

The deceased was a great lover of the sea and in 1908 took part in the rescue of the crew of the Schooner "McKein" for which deed he was presented with a silver watch by the Canadian Government.

In 1912 he and his family moved to Charlottetown, later to Southport, where he was employed by Dr. Leo Frank, at the Rosebank Fur Farms.

Upon his retirement he resided at home with his son Carlyle, and daughter - in - law, in Southport.

A few months before his death he had the misfortune of a serious fall, which necessitated his admittance to the Charlottetown Hospital. After some weeks treatment he was removed to Beach Grove for further convalescence but God willed otherwise and he gradually grew weaker until on the above mentioned date, his gentle spirit entered its eternal home to meet his Saviour.

The deceased was a devoted member of Saint Dunstan's Basilica and also of the Holy Name Society. During his illness he was visited by his Pastor, The Rev. Father Corcoran who also administered to him the last rites of the Roman Catholic Church.

There are left to mourn the loss of a kind and loving father, two sons and two daughters, namely Mrs. Fred DeCoste (adeline), Charlottetown; Mrs. George Higgins (Patricia), Summerside; Lawrence, Summerside; and Carlyle at home.

Also surviving is one sister Mrs. Catherine Conroy, Brooklyn, N.Y. and eleven grandchildren. Six daughters predeceased him in their tender years.

The funeral which was largely attended, took place, Monday morning, July 14th., at 9 o'clock, from the Hennessey Funeral to Saint Dunstan's Basilica where Requiem High Mass was solemnized by Rev. Father Reid who also officiated at the grave. The Rev. Joseph Trainor occupied a seat in the Sanctuary.

Burial took place in the family plot in the Roman Catholic Cemetery.

Electors Organizations Said Slated For PEI

A union of Electors, a non-political organization, whose purpose is to act collectively for social advancement, will be organized in Prince Edward Island it was learned last night from two organizers of the union who came here following a national convention of the union of electors at Edmondston N.B. last week.

The organizers, Bernard Gouette and Camille St. Cyr, both of New Brunswick, are enroute to the Islands and will be returning here on September 21st for their meeting which will be held in Mont Carmel and these will be followed by meetings in other areas.

The Union of Electors has no direct political or religious affiliation.

Its aims include a fair distribution of the countries natural resources.

The Union of Electors has its beginning in Quebec about 20 years ago and today claims an active membership in seven provinces.

Its bi-monthly publication in French is distributed to 60,000

homes and about 30,000 are receiving the English language bulletin issued by the organization.

ABOLISH TAXES

Almost 4,000 white bereted delegates attended the 20th annual congress of the Union of Electors in Edmondston, N.B., last week. The delegates were welcomed by Hon. Edgar Fournier, chairman of the New Brunswick Electric Power Commission. Other political leaders who attended the congress included Hon. J. Stewart Brooks, New Brunswick Minister of Public Works, and J.C. Von Horn, M.P. for Restigouche Madawaska.

A unanimous resolution by the union of electors at this congress called for the abolition of all taxes, to be replaced by "dividends" distributed by the Bank of Canada.

Another resolution asked the C.B.C. to provide the Union of Electors with fifteen minutes of broadcasting time each week over the English and French language radio and television networks.

A third resolution called on the federal government to "readjust the rates" of family allowances in keeping with today's cost of living.

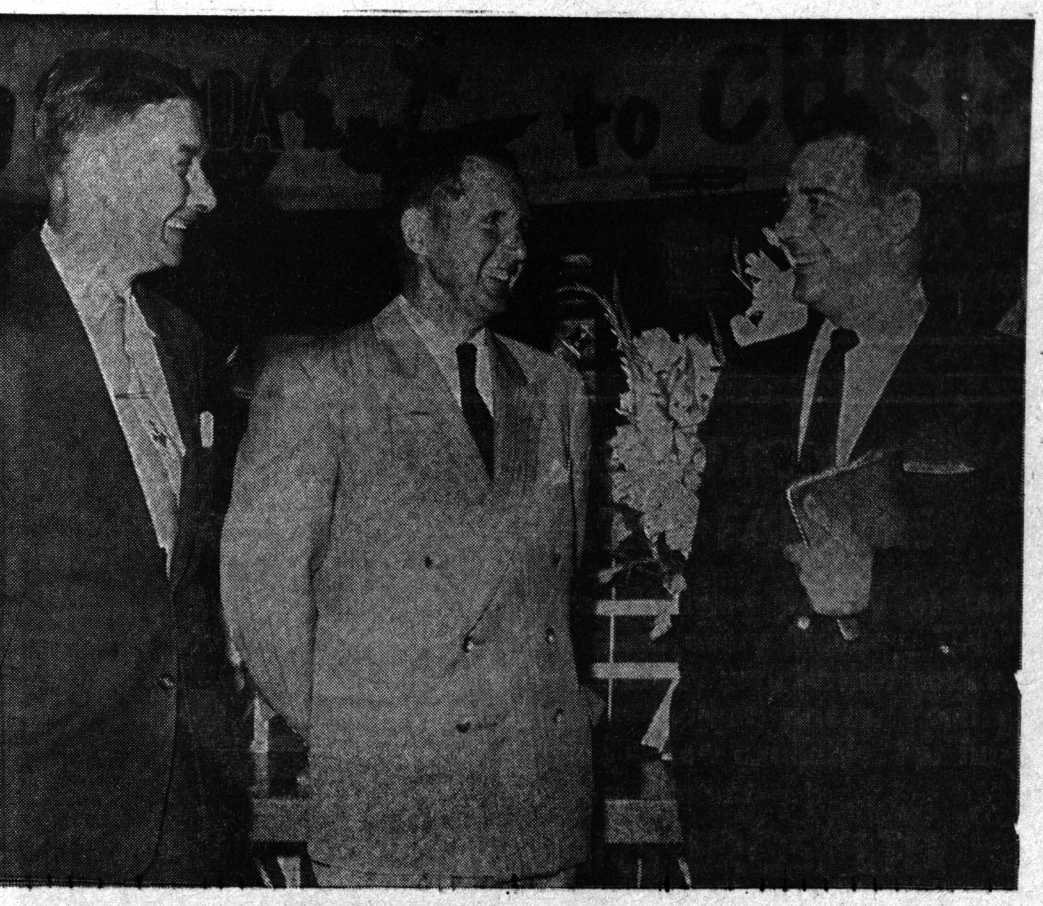
