In four separate sessions, a total of 198 boys and girls, attended by 48 leaders and staff members, enjoyed a total of 2,870 gloriously sunny days at the "Camp of a Million Memories", consumed a total of 8,610 meals, (not to mention camp fire snacks) and evening camp sessions) hiked and rowed many miles, passed swimming tests, wove baskets, braided beads, carved totem poles, played many rousing games of softball, volleyball and basketball, learned something about archery, boating and nature life, practiced camp craft and slept under the stars on overnight hikes and outings.

Cited as outstanding campers in their respective sessions were Joan Boyles, Gall Cameron, Thane Burke and Barry Wilson while Elizabeth Nicholson and Marlon Clarke, Sterling Lavers and Fred Hyndman received special commendation for their contribution as camp leaders and counselors. Particular note was made of the record achievement made by Miss Nancy Hyndman, Red-Cross-trained waterfront director for the first girls camp, who succeeded in preparing 42 of her youthful camper students to pass beginning or advanced swimming tests during their two week camping experience.

Dr. Richard Edgar Heartz, M.E., I.C., President of the Engineering Institute of Canada will make an official visit to the Prince Edward Island branch of the Institute to be held at the Charlottetown Hotel this evening Dr. Heartz will be accompanied by Dr. L. Austin Wright, general secretary of the Institute.

Dr. Heartz is president of the Shawinigan Engineering Company, Montreal. Recently he was honoured by the American Society of Mechanical Engineers by being elected an honorary member. Only four other Canadians have been so honoured.

The Engineering Institute of Canada has a membership of nearly 16,000 and has 47 active branches located throughout Canada from St. John's, Nfld. to Victoria, B.C.

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Dr. Ashford Addresses U.C. Presbytery On Drive

A special meeting of the Presbytery of Prince Edward Island, The United Church of Canada, was held in Charlottetown yesterday, and plans were laid for the inauguration of the National Stewardship Campaign to be launched in Charlottetown on the 27th of September.

Dr. H.E. Ashford addressed the Presbytery on the purpose of the Campaign and stressed the great need for a keener awareness of their stewardship responsibilities on the part of every member of the church. Dr. Ashford is the newly appointed Secretary of the Missionary and Maintenance Department of the United Church, and is a former minister of Trinity Church, Charlottetown.

As formulated yesterday, the Stewardship Campaign will be launched at a huge public meeting in the Coliseum. Some 5000 people are expected to attend. A massed choir of several hundred voices is planned. Cars will be gathered from all parts of the island and travelling in a group to Charlottetown. Estimates on the number of cars runs into the hundreds.

The main purpose of the meeting, as outlined by Dr. Ashford, is to stir up the people of the church to a greater sense of stewardship, not just in regard to their gifts to mission work but in regard to all phases of the church's work. The meeting on the 27th will be under the chairmanship of Rev. E. V. Forbes, President of the Maritime Conference. The Rt. Rev. George Dorey, Moderator of the United Church will speak, as will Rev. Sidney Bonnell of Fifth Avenue Presbyterian Church, New York, and Rev. Mr. Ashford.

Death Of Retired Baptist Minister At Summerside

The death of Rev. William A. Harper, retired Baptist Church Minister, occurred suddenly at his home in Summerside yesterday morning.

He was 54 years of age. The late Mr. Harper was regarded with the highest esteem by his parishioners and members of all other denominations who knew his acquaintance.

After a devoted and active 23 years in the ministry, a serious heart condition compelled his retirement almost two years ago.

Born in Middle Sackville, N.B., he was a graduate in arts and theology from Acadia University, and was ordained in his first pastorate at Goldboro, Guysborough County, N.S., and in succeeding years was in charge of pastorates at Keswick, N.B., Lawrenceville, N.S., and lastly at Summerside where his ministry continued for six years until his retirement.

He was a valued member of the Y's Men's Club during his years in Summerside, and took an active interest in his community as well as in his church. In both he acquired a wide circle of friends who mourn his passing.

In addition to his wife, the former Bertha Whitman, daughter of a minister of the Baptist Church, he is survived by two daughters, Beth, a student at the Conservatory of Music in Toronto, and Catherine,

a student at Summerside High School.

He is also survived by two brothers, Donald, of Middle Sackville, N.B., and Christopher, in Vancouver, and a half-sister, Mrs. C. Fred Ayer, of Sackville. The funeral will be Saturday, S.

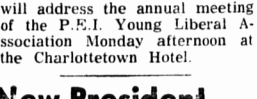

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Jersey Shipment To Newfoundland

One of the finest shipments of Jersey breeding stock to leave the Province is being shipped today to B. Mutch of North River, to Mr. H. C. Roberts, Hospital Farm, Twillingate, Nfld.

Consisting of four heifers and a young bull, the animals have been carefully selected from Mr. Mutch's own herd and from the herds of three other prominent Island breeders. In the shipment are: Poppy's Jane by Douglas Matheson, St. Peter's Bay; Design, Basil Rosemary by Albert J. Boswell, Marshfield; River North Rena's Lindy, and Bonny's Beacon (male) by Edison B. Mutch and Welkum Poppy's First by Fred F. Kitson, Hampshire. The price realized for yesterday's consignment was well above the heifer shipment of last year.

The beautiful animals displayed shows that the farmers of this area still rely on their best friend, the horse to do much of their work.

James MacNeil, assistant director of marketing services for the Nova Scotia Agriculture College, said farmers need more credit. Agriculture in the Atlantic region, he said, has never been able to attract risk capital "and what capital we have is built up by hard work." He said present credit arrangements are not satisfactory.

R. Whidden Ganong, president of APEEC, said better warehouses and cooling plants are needed. He said the smaller producer can't compete with large warehouses that carry out regular deliveries of well-conditioned and graded produce. Produce which could be produced in the Atlantic region, he said, has been shipped in from places like Texas, Florida and California during peak seasons.
