Gillette Company Undertakes Huge Expansion Program

Plans for a \$2,000,000 construction project of a major expansion program being undertaken by the Gillette Safety Razor Company of Canada Limited, were announced today by J. I. Stampelman, president.

Ground will be broken this week for Gillette's new 120,000-square-foot head office and manufacturing plant on Cote de Liesse, Montreal.

The Company, which began Canadian operations in 1905, has occupied the present Gillette Building on St. Alexander Street since 1922. Originally the plant was a manufacturing plant of its type in Canada, manifold business expansion has rendered present facilities inadequate.

Completion of the new building early in 1956 will signalize 50 years of Canadian progress for Gillette. During that time the Company has more than matched the economic progress of Canada with expansion of its own sales volume in razors and blades and in the newer field of home permanents and hair beauty products, according to Mr. Stampelman.

"The destiny of our Company is firmly linked with that of Canada," the president stated. "The money we are investing in this construction program is both a tangible expression of our faith in the continuing prosperous development of Canada and an answer to the vote of confidence given daily by Canadian consumers to our Gillette and Toni products."

The new building, situated on an 8-acre plot of land just west of the continuing traffic Circle, will contain the best of all known manufacturing facilities with comfort, convenience and safety for the Company's 300 employees.

At the front of the building, overlooking spacious, fully-landscaped grounds, will be an employee cafeteria service by a completely equipped modern kitchen. Rest, recreation and hospital facilities will also be provided.

The building will be functional, and will consist of a single-storey steel and masonry factory with a two-storey brick office building at the front. Instructions given the architects, Ross, Patterson, Townsend and Fish, included the stipulation that the front be modern without "flash," and that it be in keeping with the substantial nature of the Gillette organization.

The factory section will be served by roof monitor as well as sidewall lighting. All present office and factory requirements will be adequately housed, and facilities have been provided for future expansion.

Full advantage is being taken of all transportation facilities available to the decentralized factory-site location. A spur of the Canadian National Railways will enter the plant, and a paved service road will connect with the nearby highway and its arteries. Adequate parking facilities will be provided for both employees and visitors.

The Foundation Company of Canada, Limited, has been awarded the construction contract.
