Rural Electrification Premier J. Walter Jones told the members in answer to Maj. J. A. MacDonald that in cases of emergency the Government had granted assistance towards rural electrification at O'Leary and Alberton and that the line to Mt. The answer stated that authority was given to the Board of Public Utilities to require extension of facilities in any area, which gave an extension of approximately 125 miles yearly from 1948 to 1952. New School At Montague Completed



Photographed above is the new Montague High School completed after a little over five months under general contractor William Whiteway, of Dover. During the past two weeks grades eight, nine, ten and eleven have been moved into the new building from the former school and classes are being conducted regularly. The school, which is 111 feet by 54 feet, is of a six classroom design. In the centre of the building is a T-corridor. On the top of the T are two classrooms, and on each side of the stem are also two classrooms. The average size of each classroom is approximately 30 feet by 22 feet, each room containing coat locker, teacher's locker, and bookcase. Day lighting is provided by five large windows in each room, and night lighting by fluorescent lights. Four rooms have been completed in insul board with presswood wainscoting, and inlaid congleum on the floors. Mr. James Larkin has also completed the painting of each room which presents a very attractive appearance. Completed also is the plumbing and heating by MacLeod and Greene, and the wiring by Gilbert Clements.

West Germany Paying Costs Of Canadian Army Barracks And Airfields

OTTAWA, (CP)—West Germany will pay the bills for capital costs of army barracks and two airfields being built and set aside in that country for use of Canada's Atlantic Pact forces, the Commons committee on defence expenditures was told Tuesday. Although original Canadian statements of 18 months ago indicated that Canada did not intend to use money paid by the Germans for occupation costs, the capital costs in these cases will all come out of occupation money, a defence department document showed. The explanation given here is that the government decided some time ago that there is a difference between capital costs incurred in construction and in day-to-day costs for maintenance of the forces on the bases provided. West Germany apparently has acquiesced in this view.

Canada Pays Maintenance The upshot is that Germany will foot the bills for the barracks being built for the 27th brigade at Soest and for airfields at Zweibrücken and Baden-Söllingen. Canada does and will foot the bills for maintaining the forces that go there. The capital costs will not increase the occupation bill for Germany, officials here say, because the money will come out of existing levies paid to the occupying powers, Britain, the U. S. and France.

The document was tabled for Rodney Adamson (PC-York West). It showed that all four airfields now have been earmarked for Canada's four-wing air division, forming a rough square with the French city of Metz, headquarters of the division, in the middle and no more than 75 miles from any of the four fields. They include Grostenquin, in

France, where the 2nd wing now is stationed; Marville, France, where the 1st wing will eventually go from England; Zweibrücken, Germany, for which the 3rd wing now is heading; and Baden-Söllingen, near Baden, which will be occupied by the 4th wing later this year. All four wings are supposed to be on the continent by the end of this year. Canada is pouring \$6,000,000 apiece into the two airfields in France to add to the facilities being provided by NATO out of a general fund to which Canada also contributes. The amounts Canada is putting into the general fund were not given but they also run into the millions.
