

Free Spenders Checked By The Many Regulations

There are two new year's alternatives for Canada's big-time spenders: Throw your own party or go out of the country.
A Canadian Press survey of nightclubs from coast to coast indicates the cost of ringing in 1959—cottage, cover charge, dinner, liquor, taxis and tips—ranges from \$20 to \$50 a couple.
In the swank night spots of Toronto a man would have to work hard to get rid of more than \$100. Prices at the top hotels range to \$25 a couple for dinner, dancing and entertainment.
There is little more offered even in Montreal, a city with more nightclubs and restaurants per capita than any North American centre. Quebec law forbids selling liquor after 10 p.m. New

Year's Eve and few clubs planned special programs.
PLAN OWN PARTIES
Men with bankrolls in many cases were buying champagne, hiring servants and engaging entertainers for their own parties. Others were looking across the border.
In Toronto a Buffalo hotel advertised: "Run away with your wife." The cost for 24 hours of attention—not including transportation, liquor or tips—is \$42 a couple.
In Montreal, the Bellevue Casino club offered entertainment until dawn despite the blue law. Buses will take patrons from the club to the town hall in Burlington, Vt., 80 miles away, making return trips into the afternoon of Jan. 1. The price: \$42 a couple.

Bookings are reported medium to heavy across the country. Private parties appeared as popular as ever, particularly in Ottawa and Montreal.
ATTRACTIVE PLAN
In Alberta a night on the town appeared more attractive under the new liquor law permitting sale of drinks until 2 a.m.
For the man with little money to spare and no invitation to a party, unlicensed community halls and dance halls across the country offer music and sandwiches for as low as \$6 a couple. Many celebrants probably will smuggle in their liquor.
And there is always the midnight movie, offering a night out with hand-squeezing for \$2 a couple.
