HAVANA (AP)—Cuban armed forces struck down an attempted rebel uprising and general strike in Havana Wednesday. Thirty or more rebels were believed killed. Two were moved down by a bodyguard in an apparent attempt to assassinate Education Minister Vincento Cauce. National police pressed a relentless search through the day and night for rebel hideaways, all over Havana. They cut down some rebels in running gunfights. The rebel toll is expected to mount steadily beyond the estimated 30 dead by early evening. Fighting centred at the port district of old Havana. Rebels seized and held briefly Cuba's biggest radio and TV stations in Havana and played records telling Cubans that rebel leader Fidel Castro's threatened general strike was in effect. They gave the word for Cubans to rise up in arms against Batista. Workers at some factories and in the telephone, electric and gas companies left their jobs. Communications and electric power were out in sections of the city for a time. But the strikes were only temporary.
